

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Executive Summary and SWOC Analysis



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Congregation of Mother of Carmel pioneered into the field of Higher Education inspired by the educational vision of its founder, Saint Kuriakose Elias Chavara, in the pre-independence period, with the aim of uplifting the women of Kerala by empowering them through education. 68 years ago, in 1946, St. Mary's College was established in the heart of the flourishing business town of Thrissur as the first women's college of Thrissur district. At the time of its inception, the College was affiliated to Madras University, later it was affiliated to Kerala University and finally in 1968 it was affiliated to University of Calicut. By imparting knowledge to young women, the institution has moulded generations of responsible citizens, conscious of their privileged position and their duty to serve the society. The College can legitimately feel proud of her alumnae who are serving the society and the nation in various capacities.

In 1967 due to the increased demand for admission to the courses offered by the institution, the management decided to bifurcate the College and shifted the PG and UG courses to a newly established college at Cheroor about 5 Kms away from the hustle and bustle of the rapidly growing town. This sister institution, Vimala College, is today an A grade college with excellent academic and infrastructure facilities. The CMC Congregation had already established in 1964 another women's College, Mercy College, in Palakkad, a town backward in literacy at the time. This college is also now an A grade college promoting the education of girl children. In 1981 the CMC management established a fourth sister institution, Carmel College, in the remote region of Mala about 40 Kilometres from Thrissur city which is also an A grade college providing quality education to women.

The de-linking of Pre-Degree courses from Higher Education institutions was a critical period in the history of this pioneering College. But the experience and excellence of half a century came to her aid and with great resilience she came out victorious in the struggle for existence and introduced UG and PG courses. Today she can proudly boast of 12 UG, 10 PG, 2 B.Voc and a Ph.D programme. In the rapidly changing global education scenario it is mandatory for Higher Education institutions to keep pace with the advances made in the field of education and research. St. Mary's College has been transforming and adapting at a fast rate to meet the challenges of the hi-tech modern educational system. The College has made giant strides towards excellence since the two accreditations which provided the College with an impetus to introspect, analyze and fortify the strengths and rectify the weaknesses. The College was accredited with B+ grade in 2004 and with 'A' grade in 2010.

The history of the College in the span of five years since its re-accreditation in 2010 shows a tremendous growth in all aspects and spheres of the institution. The number of PG programmes offered has doubled and there is more than 50% growth in the number of UG programmes offered. The College has adopted and internalized modern and innovative pedagogical strategies to enhance the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process. In the field of research too, the College has shown a marked improvement. The number of permanent teachers with Ph. D has doubled after the last accreditation. In the last 5 years a lot of renovation and addition of infrastructure was



done to provide adequate infrastructure facilities for the additional UG, PG, Ph.D. and B.Voc programmes introduced. Individual and institutional support is provided to the students in a variety of ways, as the holistic development of the students is the objective of the institution. The College has always paid attention to the spiritual, moral and intellectual growth of the students. The effective decentralizing administration provided by the CMC nuns has been the key factor in the success of the institution. Over a long period of time the College has initiated and internalized a large number of healthy and best practices that have contributed to academic excellence and overall sterling performance of the institution.

The biggest victory of the College lies in its dynamism to adapt to the changing needs of the society from time to time. Over the years the status of women in Kerala society has changed and there has been a marked increase in the number of working women. Today women students outnumber men in the UG and PG programmes of most colleges in Kerala. Women's education is a top priority in most of the families of Kerala. In this context students are not content with any higher education. They demand quality education that can keep pace with the rapid advances in the field of ICT. The institution as always has risen to the current need and has introduced ICT in governance, day to day administration and teaching-learning.

There is only one aspect that has remained unchanged in the long span of 68 years of imparting education. The College has from the beginning till now given utmost importance to value education. Weekly ethics and catechism classes, annual retreats for all catholic students, Talks and Seminars on ethics, Life Guidance Course for all final year students are some of the healthy practices that have contributed to the strong foundation on which the College rests today. In conformity to its motto the College has given top priority to discipline and has worked for the internalization of a culture of discipline in the lives of her students. The College has also been in the forefront in its commitment to society. One of the first steps in the path of service to the society was the establishment of the Social Service League in 1951. In 1955 Smt. Indira Gandhi visited the College for collecting the Assam Flood Relief Fund. In 1962 the College was awarded the Chief Minister's Trophy for the collection of the highest amount for the Defence Fund in the state. In 1971 the Society for St Mary's College Jubilee Memorial Kudumbakshema Paddhathi was registered with the objective of promoting the welfare of families by making them self-reliant and helping them to live as decent and useful citizens. As part of the Silver Jubilee Celebration 25 houses and as part of Golden Jubilee Celebration 7 houses were constructed for the poor and the needy. A crèche, nursery and a tailoring unit were established at Nadathara for the benefit of local people. The College has continued this tradition of community orientation up to this day. A number of community extension activities for the under privileged sections of the society is being carried out still which will be dealt in detail in Criterion III.


Criterion 1: Curricular Aspects

As a pioneering institution of higher education the College promotes the pursuit of academic excellence and higher education among women. There has been a marked increase in the number of programmes offered by the institution in the past



5 years. While the College was offering 8 UG and 5 PG courses at the time of the last reaccreditation in 2010, currently the College offers 12 UG, 10 PG, 2 B Voc and a Ph.D Programme. In addition to these, 5 UGC Add Ons, 7 Certificate Courses and 6 Skill Enhancement Courses are being offered to equip the students with additional skills.

Competitive Examination Coaching, NET Coaching, Talks, Seminars, Workshops, Value Education, Observation of Important Days etc. contribute to the holistic development of the students. Spoken English classes are conducted to enhance competence of students and thus to ensure employability. With the introduction of Choice Based Credit Semester System for UG and PG programmes greater flexibility has been imparted to the students in the choice of subjects. Open Courses, Electives and Complementary Courses give the students a wide range of options to choose from. Topics of current relevance like Gender, Environment, Informatics, Human Rights etc. have become a part and parcel of the syllabus of all UG programmes. Project work is mandatory for all UG and PG programmes. Linkage with industries and project work done at industries and research institutions help the students earn first-hand knowledge



of industry and thus gain more orientation in their field of study. Interdepartmental and Intercollegiate programmes, competitions and exhibitions are organized which echo the spirit of gender sensitization, environment protection, observation of human rights and the like. Various programmes are organized to sensitize the students in current issues and make them responsible and responsive to social issues. The new initiatives and programmes that have been introduced on the basis of the feedback from all the stakeholders are adequate to empower young Marians.

Criterion 2: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The College has a transparent admission process. To encourage diversity in our student profile, quota for students from backward communities, minorities etc. are filled according to the Government and University rules. Thus students with excellent academic credentials as well as first generation learners from disadvantaged sections of the society seek admission to the institution. Sport students are attracted to the institution as they are admitted to the course of their choice and are offered fee concession, special nutritious food, free hostel accommodation, special provisions for coaching etc. In Self-financing programmes, students from the socially backward sections who top the merit list are given financial support from the Government.



Deserving students have an option to remit the fee in installments. Some students are also sponsored by well-wishers. The social, economic and geographical profile of the applicants is considered for admission to seats under management quota. Needy students are also informed and supported by Government scholarships, Institutional freeships and other schemes for food and accommodation in the hostel. There is a great demand for our programmes due to the disciplined atmosphere, good academic output and general atmosphere conducive to learning that is prevalent in the campus.

Orientation Programmes and Bridge Courses are conducted with the objective of bridging the gap in the subject knowledge of the newly admitted students. Enrichment Programmes like Walk with Scholar (WWS), Scholar Support Programme and Skill Development Programmes like ASAP, UGC Add Ons, Certificate courses etc. are offered by the institution. These new-age programmes have a well-charted curriculum and are taught by well-qualified faculty. Value Education, Life Guidance Course, Annual retreats, Programmes on Personality Development and Stress Management techniques etc. are organized for the benefit of all students. Learning is made more student-centric by making it more participatory and interactive through group discussions, field survey/field work, role play and academic debates. Co-curricular and cultural events help students in chiseling out their personality. Tutorial and Mentoring address the individual needs of the students. Slow and Advanced learners are identified and appropriate measures are taken according to their ability. Students with disability are provided with assistance as per their needs. Visually challenged students are provided with Braille study materials and Scribe for writing examinations. Counselling is available in the campus to address problems related to stress, anxiety, examination phobia, peer pressure etc. To develop research aptitude, students undertake research projects and visit research institutions. Research Forum arranges Talks by eminent researchers. The College celebrates National Science Day every year with Talks, Seminars, and various competitions to inculcate in the students a scientific temper. To mould young women into well-developed personalities, Women Cell organizes gender sensitization programmes and Bhoomitrasena club organizes programmes to increase awareness about environmental issues. All students participate in Compulsory Social Service Scheme of Calicut University and are encouraged to help out each other both financially and academically. The Placement Cell acquaints students of various career options and encourages them to take charge of their career development.

Evaluation process is done in a time bound and transparent manner and the result is displayed on the student notice board. In case of any grievance students may approach the Grievance Redressal Cell. Matters relating to University results including withheld results, grades published wrongly etc. are solved by intimating the University and remedial measures being taken.

The College has 14 Smart class rooms, 2 Computer labs, 2 Browsing centres, a Multipurpose Computer Centre with Language Lab facility and 5 Seminar halls with audio-visual equipments. The Science and Computer Science laboratories are well equipped. The College also has a well-equipped, fully automated library with a



separate section for Reference Books, Text books and CD ROMs. E-resources are hosted through N-LIST service of the INFLIBNET. Free internet facility is available to the staff and students.

Criterion 3: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Research and consultancy are two areas in which the College lagged behind at the time of the first two accreditations. But the efforts of the management in the post accreditation phase to inculcate a research attitude in the faculty and students has paved the way for a marked increase in research and consultancy in the institution. Realizing the role of research in enhancing the relevance of the College in the global scenario, the management adopted the policy of recruiting faculty with Ph.D or doing research. The College publishes an annual referred journal "Annals of Basic and Applied Sciences". The Department of Mathematics was recognized as a Research Centre in 2011 and two of the faculty in the Department, Dr. Sr. Magie Jose and Dr. Parvathy K S are registered guides of the Centre. Five research scholars are carrying out research under them. Dr. Regi Raphael of the Department of Botany is a research guide under Bharathiar University. 15 Minor projects were granted to the faculty in the last 4 years. Popularisation of Science Project of KSCSTE has been granted to Sr.



Dr. Meena K Cheruvathoor of the Department of Botany and she has been actively propagating the benefits of medicinal plants to the society. Smt. Krishna K Yathi of the Biotechnology Department has two patents to her credit in the field of Molecular Biology.

The research findings of the faculty have been contributing to the improvement of products which in turn have benefited the society. There are 126 Journal publications and 188 Conference Papers by faculty in the last 4 years. 5 Books and 9 chapters in various books have been published by faculty. Many of the programmes introduced like Biotechnology and Microbiology are research oriented and these departments have great opportunity for research and consultancy. 8 UGC sponsored National Seminars were organised in the last 4 years. Research motivational Seminars and Talks are conducted by the Research Committee to promote research in the faculty and the students. Dr. Litty Mathew Irimpan, HOD, Dept. of Physics, was awarded the 'Leading Scientist of the World' 2012 by International Biographical Centre, UK. The valuable contributions of our former Principal, Sr. Dr. Rani George, towards the promotion of a research culture in the College was acknowledged through the institution of an endowment fund of Rs.1 lakh for conducting an Endowment Lecture and a National Level Paper Presentation Competition annually.

The College has been in the forefront in its commitment to the society from the very beginning. The adoption of Nadathara Village and the setting up of a crèche and tailoring unit with assistance from the Kerala State Social Welfare Board, the Jubilee Memorial St. Mary's College Kudumbakshema Paddahati, CASP etc. are milestones in this area. The College continues with this tradition of service and has many community extension projects. St Mary's Square Outreach Sponsorship Programme which aims at the adoption and holistic development of 40 under privileged children of St Mary's Convent UP School Chiyyaram, Blood Donation programme of Biotechnology Department, Santhwana Sparsham, the Organ Donation Awareness Programme of English Department, Vatsalyam, Serve the Poor and the Needy Programme of Economics Department, Computer literacy to 13 Communities inside and outside the College by Computer Science Department, Pain and Palliative Care by History Department are all programmes designed to reach out to the less fortunate and lend them a helping hand. The introduction of Bachelor of Social Work has provided an impetus to the community oriented activities and an MOU is being signed by the College with Kolazhy Panchayat by which the College will be adopting Kolazhy Panchayat and converting it to a Child Friendly Panchayat. The Department of Botany has undertaken various projects like cleaning a public well, Popularization of Science and distribution of medicinal plants to various sections of the society.

Criterion 4: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College is a role model for all institutions with space constraint on the optimal utilization of infrastructure. The strategic location of the College in the heart of Thrissur city is both a bane and a boon. The central location of the College provides ample transport facilities. But the unavailability of land for expansion and the ancient buildings built before the Kerala State Building Rules came into being prevent demolition and construction of new buildings. Hence the only way to augment the infrastructure is through renovation and restructuring. Hence a mega renovation of the Old Hostel was undertaken after the completion of the construction of the new hostel. The introduction of 11 new programmes had brought about an acute shortage of class rooms which was solved through the renovation of the Old Hostel to provide 36 classrooms, 3 Seminar Halls, a Gym and 4 department staff rooms. Another area which needed expansion was the infrastructure for sports and games, as the land available for the practice of various sports and games was inadequate. In 2010, 1.76 acres of the land was acquired about 1.5 kms from the main campus for the construction of sports and games courts and an indoor stadium. Microbiology and Biotechnology Labs were renovated to provide better infrastructure facilities, and the Chemistry and Botany Labs were restructured for the introduction of PG Labs. A Tissue Culture Lab, a Project Lab and a Psychology Lab and an Instrument Room were newly constructed. The St. Joseph's Block has been renovated to provide a Research Centre, a Multipurpose Computer Centre and a Browsing Centre. 2 Examination Halls and 2 Seminar Halls with ICT facility were also added for the smooth conduct of examinations and enrichment programmes. The New Hostel completed in 2010 is spacious, well ventilated and clean, and provides accommodation for both staff and students. Security of the students is ensured in the campus and the hostel. There are 3 Biogas Plants and 3 Rainwater Harvesting pits for waste management and conservation of water resources. Herbal and Medicinal gardens, a Vertical garden and a Butterfly garden were setup to provide greenery in the campus.14 Classrooms have been upgraded to Smart Classes to make the teaching learning ICT enabled. The fully automated, well stocked and user friendly library is one of the main attractions and sources of knowledge of the College.

Criterion 5: Student Support and Progression

The College has been catering to the needs and requirements of the students of different sections of the society and with different abilities by offering scholarships, financial support and freeships. Apart from Government aided scholarships and other financial support, the College has the institutional practice of offering freeships and financial support to the deserving. Remedial Coaching, Peer teaching, Tutoring, Mentoring and Counselling offer scope for all round development of students. The CMC Nirmala Province which governs the College has 74 educational institutions of good reputation, efficient administration and academic excellence to its credit. The vast experience in the field of education has given the management the necessary vision to plan in advance and to execute in a timely fashion the academic and administrative needs of the College. The College is a missionary institution with a well-defined Vision and Mission of empowering young women. The decision making body of the institution is the Governing Body which is assisted by two other committees, the Education Committee and the Local Management Committee. Internal coordination is effectively implemented by the Principal in consultation with the College Council and IQAC. The systematically organized hierarchical structure of the CMC Management ensures effective leadership at all levels of administration. Criterion 7: Innovations and Best Practices

The College has internalized and institutionalized a number of Healthy and Best Practices which have paved the way for an academic ambience conducive to learning in the institution. Regular and systematic administration, recruitment of highly qualified faculty, clean, beautiful and well maintained campus, a disciplined atmosphere, constant upgradation and maintenance of infrastructure, Tutorial, Mentoring, well developed Institutional Social Responsibility, Value Education and participatory management are some of the healthy practices that the College has been implementing since its inception. To keep pace with the modern educational scenario the College has introduced a number of innovative programmes designed to make teaching-learning more student centric and ICT enabled and to create environment consciousness in the students.

The College has organized a number of seminars, talks, exhibitions, demonstration classes, awareness classes, competitions, surveys and presentations as part of the urge to conserve and preserve nature and its precious resources. Green audit is done in the campus under the initiative of Department of Botany to evaluate the measures undertaken by the College in protecting the environment and limiting the use of non-renewable resources. Use of Solar Water Heaters, Rain water harvesting, setting up and maintenance of RET, Herbal, Fern, Orchid and Botanical Gardens. Seedling production and distribution, effective waste management, vermi compost pit and use of incinerators are the highlights of measures to protect the environment and for biodiversity conservation. The College has initiated a cleanliness drive *L'Aria Fresca* to ensure a clean campus and premises. Each Department has a set of best practices which has a positive impact on the institution. A number of new initiatives were introduced in the post accreditation phase to improve the performance of the institution as a whole.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

The College is one of the premier institutions established in 1946 and managed by the CMC Educational Society of Nirmala Province of the Congregation of the Mother of Carmel under the jurisdiction of the Roman Catholic Church of Thrissur Archidiocese. According to CMC Educational Policy, 'Education is a sacred call aiming at the pursuit of intellectual and professional excellence transforming a human being for the service of society and nation'.

Vision

Our Vision is the holistic development of young women through academic excellence, intellectual, moral and spiritual growth to equip them for service to society and mould them as responsible citizens.

Mission

We envisage to groom young women as agents of love, justice and peace through love of God, pursuit of knowledge, moral integrity and social responsibility. We dedicate ourselves to inculcate in young Marians deep-rooted commitment to society and build a society which promotes faith, religious harmony and national integration.

Motto

The Motto of the College "Scientia et Disciplina" i.e., "Knowledge and Discipline" encompasses the twin aspects of personal growth that are necessary for overall development. The College stands for the holistic development of young women through education which focuses on the following Core Values:

- Love of God
- Academic Excellence
- Moral Values
- Woman Empowerment
- Service to Society and Nation

The very functioning of the institution is in tune with the Vision and Mission. The Vision and Mission of the College are communicated through the Institutional Website, Prospectus and College Calendar. They are also displayed at prominent places inside the campus. An orientation is given to the newly appointed staff on the CMC Education Policy by the Manager. Booklets of the CMC Education Policy are also given to them. The Principal reiterates the aims and objectives of the institution



at the beginning of each academic year. An Orientation is given to the parents and first year students on the opening day of the UG and PG Programmes. The Vision and Mission of the College and of the departments are also communicated to the students in the tutorial hours. Information on Vision and Mission is disseminated through Parent Teacher Meetings and meetings of Elder St. Marians which remind them of their role as stakeholders of the institution.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The Principal in consultation with the Vice Principal and the College Council plans the academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. An Academic Calendar and an Action Plan are prepared at the onset of the academic year based on the University Academic Calendar. The departments prepare their timetable and action plan according to College Calendar. The syllabus is divided among the faculty according to their respective areas of specialization. Departments discuss and Plan teaching strategies for the effective implementation of curriculum. Individual teachers prepare a monthly teaching plan to organize the teaching process. Seminars, Workshops and Extension lectures by subject experts are organized to supplement the curriculum transaction. ICT enabled teaching and innovative teaching methods like Audio classes are effectively used to make the curriculum up-to-date.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Orientations, Refresher Courses and other Short Term Courses and Workshops are organized by the University to equip the teachers with the latest trends in their respective disciplines. The College also conducts Seminars, Workshops and Orientations and provides the faculty practical training in the use of ICT aided teaching and motivates them to introduce innovative methods to diversify the curriculum. INFLIBNET facility which gives the faculty access to e-books and e-journals is also provided.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

Even though the curriculum is designed by the University, the College takes utmost care in delivering the curriculum in the most effective and systematic manner. Annual academic plan is designed taking into consideration the effective curriculum delivery and transaction. The general time table is prepared by the Time table Committee based on which the departments prepare the Time table for the academic year. The Head of the Department in consultation with the faculty divide the syllabus and allots it to each faculty. The Management takes initiatives for uninterrupted execution of the teaching-learning process. The integration of technology into the teaching-learning process is a



priority of the institution. Staff vacancies are filled on time for uninterrupted teaching learning process. The institution also organizes seminars and other training programmes to give better exposure to students and teachers. A networking with colleges in the neighborhood helps the faculty members to exchange ideas on the curriculum.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

The institution has a networking with industry and research institutes. Students are taken on industrial visits to get first-hand knowledge of their subject of study. The B. Voc programmes introduced in the current academic year are designed in collaboration with the industry. The industrialists will train the students, provide expert classes, and involve in their live projects. The Department of Computer Science in association with Start up Village, an entrepreneurship promotion venture of the Government of Kerala, orga

nized a State Level Seminar for developing the entrepreneurial skills of the students of the region. The Departments also motivate final year students to take up projects in industries. The students of Computer Science Department have taken up projects in Startup Village, Kochi and students of Departments of Biotechnology and Microbiology have also taken up projects in the industry. The Department of Botany in collaboration with Oushadi Pharmaceuticals Corporation has set up a Herbal garden in the College. Faculty and students also avail the library and research facilities of other institutions like the University of Calicut, John Mathai Centre, CDS, Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala Sahitya Academy, Government Sanskrit College, Thripunithara, CUSAT and so on.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)

Our faculty have contributed to the development of the curriculum in many ways. A feedback was taken from all the faculty on the newly introduced semester system and many of the suggestions for reform were implemented. The syllabus of all the programmes were revised and the grading system was reformed on the basis of the feedback. The faculty who are Board members are actively involved in the design and revision of the curriculum. Smt. Reena A R is a member of the Steering Committee of the B.Voc programme of Calicut University. Our faculty are also represented in the Board of Studies of autonomous colleges. Dr. Hemamalini M is a member of the Board of Studies of Malayalam at St. Thomas College, Thrissur, an autonomous college. Some of the faculty members attended meetings organised in connection with revision and modification of curriculum. Based on the feedback from the students, parents and teachers, the Heads of Departments formally request the University authorities for changes and additions in the curriculum. Suggestions with regard to curriculum is



informally informed to the Board of Studies by the faculty. The Principal considers it as her responsibility to convey the needs of the departments and College to the concerned authorities through the Principals' meet and other interactive sessions in the University. Faculty members also participate in Board meetings of Practical Examinations, Viva Voce etc. and provide necessary suggestions.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the Courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating\University) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The Skill Enhancement Cell gives direction to the Departments to organize different Skill Enhancement and Certificate Courses. The UGC Add-On Courses are provided based on demand.

Add-Ons, Certificate Courses and Skill Enhancement Courses were introduced taking into consideration the demand and needs of the students. The curriculum for the Add-Ons and all the departmental Certificate Courses and Skill Enhancement Courses are designed and developed by the departments. The duration, fee structure, examination schedule, faculty credentials etc. are planned in advance to meet the requirements of the courses.

Formal and informal feedbacks are obtained from all the stakeholders on different aspects of curriculum and its transaction and remedial measures are undertaken wherever necessary to ensure that the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved. Continuous evaluation and various competitions organized on the subject help in making sure that the curriculum has been transacted effectively.

Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses

The College is one among the first batch of colleges that has started offering the very innovative programme recently introduced by UGC, the B.Voc Programme. Two B.Voc programmes, B.Voc in Software Development and B. Voc in Multimedia are being offered from this academic year. There is great flexibility in the admission procedures and in the duration of the B.Voc programme. There is no age limit at the entry level of the programme and a +2 two, graduate or a post graduate student can apply for the programme. By studying one year of the programme a student has the opportunity to acquire a diploma in the programme. Degree is awarded only on completion of 3 years. Students of all programmes are given the privilege of choosing Open Courses conducted by other disciplines.

Graduate students of certain disciplines are allowed to join the post graduate courses of other streams. Students who completed B.A Economics can join M.A History if they have graduated with History as their complementary. B.Sc Mathematics and B.Sc Statistics students can opt for M.A Applied Economics provided they have the stipulated minimum marks. B.Sc Botany students can opt for M.Sc Microbiology and Biotechnology and so on.

Enrichment courses



Apart from UGC Add Ons, Skill Enhancement Courses and Certificate Courses, the College conducts a number of programmes for capability enhancement of the students. PSC/UPSC coaching is provided to all III Semester Degree students. V and VI Semester Degree students attend various Career Guidance Programmes.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from. Other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The College offers 6 UG and 7 PG self-financed programmes. The admission norms, curriculum and fee structure for both the self-financing and regular courses are fixed by the University. The fees of the self-financing programmes is much higher than the regular courses so as to meet the expenses incurred in offering the programme. The fee structure is revised from time to time as per the orders of the University.

The admission to M.Sc Biotechnology and M.Sc Computer Science is based on the Common Entrance Test and Counseling conducted by the University. The recruitment of teachers for the self-financing courses is purely on the basis of merit, qualification, experience and the performance in the personal interview. When NET qualified teachers are not available, others are considered. The institution offers periodic salary hike and yearly increment to the faculty of self-financing courses.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to



regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

The College offers 5 UGC sponsored Add On Courses for I DC students. Forty students are admitted to each Add On Course. In addition to these, 6 Skill Enhancement Courses are also offered to I DC students. PSC Coaching and 8 Certificate Courses are offered to II DC students. Career Guidance Classes are given to III DC students. The College timing was rescheduled to accommodate these courses and all the students are expected to enroll in at least one of these courses. NET coaching is provided by select departments to PG students.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'Yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

Calicut University does not permit a combination of conventional face to face and distance mode of education. Students are free to equip themselves with additional qualifications in the Conventional or Distance Mode.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The institution has always worked in accordance to the Vision and Mission of its founders while at the same time adapting to the advances and changes in the Higher Educational Scenario. Holistic development of the students and Value education have always been an integral part of the institution. To meet the challenges of globalization, the College has implemented various strategies to improve the IT and soft skills of the students. UGC Add On courses and Certificate Courses designed by the departments have helped the students to acquire additional skills andenhance their employability. Bridge courses and Remedial coaching are provided to slow learners. Peer Teaching, provision of extra study material, mentoring, and innovative teaching methods boost the morale of the students. Two new initiatives of Government of Kerala, Scholar Support Programme, a remedial programme for slow learners and Walk with Scholar, a mentoring programme for advanced learners, have been introduced from this academic year.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Students are equipped to use ICT tools for seminar and project presentations. Online project/assignment submission and correction is followed by select Departments. Interaction with industries and research institutions is carried out to



expose the students to the application level of theoretical aspects they have learnt. Students are given the opportunity to acquire additional skills through Open Courses, Add On Courses and Certificate courses.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

Moral and ethical values

Value Education has been an integral part of the institution from its establishment in 1946 as the College is a missionary institution run by the CMC management. An hour is allotted every week for imparting value education to all students. Attending Life Guidance course is mandatory for all final year students. The objective of this course is to equip the students to take up the responsibilities of an adult in the family, society and the nation by giving them the basic facts of marital life, sex education and the crucial role of women in the character formation of children. Annual retreat for Catholic students and simultaneous spiritual renewal for Non-Catholic students is also a part of the College Calendar.

Employable and life skills

In the span of five years, 8 UGC Add On Courses have been offered to impart additional skills to make the students employable. All the departments design and offer Certificate Courses to improve the career prospects of the students. A number of Forums and Clubs like the Entrepreneurial Development Club are active in promoting additional skills to enhance the employability of the students.

Better career options

The Career Guidance Cell of the College has been orienting the students towards a career by providing PSC coaching, NET coaching, soft skills and additional skills training, Career guidance seminars are also organized frequently by the CGPT Cell and the departments to give the students an awareness on the Career opportunities available in their chosen area of study.

Community Orientation

Compulsory Social Service is a part of the curriculum of all colleges affiliated to the University of Calicut. All students have to put in 42 days of social service work towards the attainment of UG degree. In addition to this the College has a number of outreach activities like St. Mary's Square Outreach- an educational sponsorship programme, Medical camps, Blood Donation camps, Organ Donation programme, *Vatsalyam* for serving the vulnerable etc The institution has introduced a cleanliness drive 'L'Aria Fresca-Clean Campus, Clean City' in the last academic year. Various



activities are undertaken to clean the College and premises. Two NSS units and an NCC unit are actively involved in a number of community oriented activities. In collaboration with St. Mary's College, Sath Sang organised an inter-religious meet on 9th November 2014. The programme was inaugurated by Kerala Governor, P.Sathasivam. Eminent personalities from various religions presented their views in the programme

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The College has developed a mechanism to get a detailed feedback about the Course, Course content, relevance and curriculum delivery by the teacher. The feedback received from the students is analyzed by each department. Informal feedback is obtained from the participants of seminars/ conferences, campus placement companies, alumnae, employers, community, academic peers, industry and parents. Based on the feedback from the students and parents the following actions were taken to enrich the curriculum

- UG programme in Polymer Chemistry restructured to UG programme in Chemistry
- 5 UGC Add On Courses introduced in the last 5 years
- Certificate Courses and Skill Enhancement Courses introduced based on the feed back
- Upgradation of 14 classrooms to Smart Classes
- Career oriented Core and Complementary courses introduced
- Introduction of Language Lab software
- Audio classes for teaching communicative English.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The College monitors and evaluates quality enhancement programmes. Syllabus of Certificate Courses and Skill Enhancement Courses are prepared by the respective departments keeping in mind demands of the industry and global market. The College has a formal feedback system to evaluate all the programmes and courses. The feedback is taken once a year and it is analyzed and appropriate actions are taken to improve the quality of the programmes/ courses offered. The feedback is discussed in the Staff Club and committee meetings and new and innovative strategies are implemented from time to time to enrich the curriculum. PTA and alumnae also evaluate the quality of the programmes. IQAC of the College plays an important role in ensuring the quality of enrichment programmes.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?



Though the institution is not directly involved in the design and development of the curriculum, suggestions are placed before the respective Board of Studies for major and minor changes in the curriculum. The College has an active role in designing the curriculum of new innovative programmes like the B Voc. At the time of transition from annual to semester system, the faculty of all departments attended orientations on the same and contributed to the introduction of the Choice Based Credit Semester System. The curriculum of the UGC Add On courses is designed by the departments and is sent to the University which, after verification and necessary modifications is approved by the University.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The College collects feedbacks from parents, students, alumnae and employers which is analyzed by the IQAC and suggestions for improvement are communicated to the departments. Based on the feedback, requests for introduction of new programmes, changes in elective papers, complementary and open courses are sent to the university. A major restructuring that has taken place in the last 5 years is the restructuring of UG polymer Chemistry to UG Chemistry. Innovative methods of teaching are also introduced based on the feedback.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

A Ph. D, two UG and three PG programmes were introduced in the last 4 years. Two UG, two PG and two B.Voc Programmes have been introduced in the current academic year. The new courses were chosen based on the feedback from the stakeholders. The principle behind the choice of the programmes is that they should be career, research and community oriented. The introduction of M.A Applied Economics, M.Com, B.Com, BBA, BSW and B.A English with Journalism and Audio visual Communication as complementaries were based on this principle. Another rationale for the introduction of new courses is the expansion of the existing departments to research centers. Ph. D in Mathematics, M. Sc. Chemistry and M. Sc. Botany were introduced based on this rationale. The College was prompt in taking up the opportunity to introduce the very innovative programme implemented by UGC, the B. Voc. degree, as interacting with the industry is the need of the day and two B.Voc. Degree Programmes have been introduced in this academic year.



CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Admission Process

The College has a transparent admission process. The dates of admission to the courses as per University guidelines are displayed on the website and advertised through newspapers and the rank list of students eligible for admission are displayed on the College notice board. For the past two years, University has changed the undergraduate admission procedure to online. Merit admissions to MSc Computer Science and MSc Biotechnology are based on entrance examinations.

The College ensures wide publicity for admission by printing the College Prospectus containing the Profile of the College, details of Academic Programmes, the Vision and Mission of the institution, student support and the scholarships for meritorious students etc. Complete details of the institution are placed on the Institutional website to facilitate online access to the requisite information about the College and various courses. Advertisement is given in leading newspapers regarding the seats vacant, if any, in different Programmes.

Students with excellent academic credentials as well as first generation learners from disadvantaged sections of the society seek admission to the College. Student enrolment procedures are in strict accordance to the admission policy laid down by the University of Calicut and the Government of Kerala from time to time. The eligibility criteria, dates for distribution and collection of application forms, publication of rank list that includes confirmed list and waiting list, admission notification and date for the completion of admission process, are all decided by the University. Transparency in the admission process is meticulously observed and the lists of candidates to be admitted both on merit and statutory reservation are displayed on the College notice board. Admission process is carried out according to this list. Reservation seats for backward communities and sports quota are filled according to the Government rules. In the instance of vacant seats, the College advertises the vacancies in the newspaper.

50% of the seats are allotted for open merit, 20% for reservation students (one seat in all subjects is reserved for students from Lakshadweep irrespective of their caste and religion), 10% community quota and the remaining 20% is management quota with a minimum cut off merit. 1% of the merit seats in degree courses are reserved for the physically handicapped. Two seats in the merit quota in each discipline are reserved for Sports Quota. In case of self-financing programmes 50%



of the seats are allotted for open merit and 50% for management quota. A Selection Committee (7 members) chaired by the Manager, decides the minimum marks for admission to each subject in the management quota. From the list prepared, selection is made giving due consideration to the children and relatives of Teaching and Ministerial staff, applicants belonging to the Catholic community and also the poor and marginalized.

Eligibility for various UG and PG programmes is based on the marks obtained in the qualifying examinations: Plus two for UG and UG for PG. Weightage for NCC, NSS and Ex-service men quota is as per the Government rules.

The Admission Committee in the College coordinates and supervises the entire process. The Committee comprises of the Principal, Vice Principal, Office Superintendent, Coordinator, Joint Coordinator and ten staff members. The admission process begins as and when the University announces the duties of admission. The application forms can be obtained from the College. The rank list is compiled by the Admission Committee and is then displayed on the notice board. Prospective students, in the merit list and waiting list, are intimated the date and time of admission by post. In the absence of a candidate, the student who succeeds in the rank list is admitted. On the day of the admission, students whose admission has been confirmed meet with the Principal for a personal interview. All the necessary documents and mark lists are verified and the candidate is admitted after payment of fees. A copy of the admission list is also sent to the University.

The University of Calicut conducts a common entrance test for admission to the MSc Biotechnology and MSc Computer Science programmes. Selection of students is based on the performance in the test.

The student profile of the College is often a healthy mix of young women who are high achievers and under-achievers, the privileged and the marginalised, cutting across different economic and social backgrounds. A Bridge Course is conducted by Departments to familiarize the students with their subject area during the first week of the class.

For Ph.D programme scholars who have cleared their JRF can apply directly to the Research Centre. Other candidates appear for the entrance exam of the University, and those who clear the test are allotted Research Centres and Guides according to their preference and specialization. The scholars in consultation with the supervisor prepare a research proposal which is presented before the pre-doctoral committee consisting of an External Expert, Research Guide and the Head of the Department. The selected candidates are registered according to the University norms.

50% each of the seats in self-financing programmes is assigned for Merit and Management quota. The fee structure is stipulated by the University. Students from the socially backward sections who top the merit list are given financial support from the Government. The Management collects the fee in instalments, and some students are sponsored by well-wishers.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The entire process of admission is executed and reviewed by the Admission Committee constituted in the College. The vacancies are filled by students listed in the rank list. The University provides a time span for admission after which it is declared closed. The vacancies for SC/ST are advertised three times in the newspapers and in their absence, are filled by other students. Twenty percent of seats in each discipline are allotted to the Management. The Management Admission Committee comprises of the Manager, Local Manager, Principal, Vice Principal, one faculty, senior non-teaching staff, and a local external member. This Committee fixes a minimum required mark for consideration to the Management seat. Due consideration is given to students who excel in cultural and extension activities, students from the locality, economically backward or any other deserving student. The requests of well-wishers, alumnae, staff, and others are also considered.

The institution reviews the admission process and student profile annually and new programmes are initiated in the self-financing stream or seat number is increased as per University sanction based on the demand.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion:SC/ST, OBC, Women, Differently abled, Economically weaker sections, Minority community, Any other.



The Institution was founded exclusively for the education of women, and therefore only girls are granted admission. The reservation policy of the Government is adhered to in the case of SC/ST, OBC, Community, etc. The seats assigned for merit and reservation are strictly according to the regulatory authorities like the Government and University. The seats allotted for community merit by the Government caters to the minority segment of which the College is a part. The economically and socially backward students benefit from Government scholarships and Institutional freeships and other schemes for food and accommodation in the hostel. Reservation policies of the Government are rigidly followed to ensure that the strategies adopted by the Government for the creation of equity and provision of access to the SC/ST and OBC applicants are implemented. Apart from the financial support from Government, the institution provides financial support and other freeships to the deserving students. Physically challenged students are admitted adhering to Government norms.

The College provides Management and Endowment scholarships and prizes for students from economically weaker backgrounds. Students are made aware of the freeships in the form of free books, uniforms, free meals, free accommodation and study material available to them.

Sports students are given admissions in the programme of their choice. In addition to the seats reserved by the University, seats in management quota are also allotted to the students excelling in sports. Various Student support measures are provided to the sports students.

Awareness is given to the students about various government scholarships and stipends available from time to time through public address system and notice board. Nodal Officer for the Scholarships and Stipends and Administrative staff in charge give directions and support to the students in this regard.

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to Government policies in this regard?

According to the government norms, one seat in all programmes is reserved for students with 40 % disability.

- Braille study materials and Audio cassettes are available in the library for the visually challenged students
- Extra time is given to these students for exam on request
- Scribe provided for blind students
- If possible, classrooms are shifted to a space convenient for the physically challenged students.
- Learning assistance is provided through peer teaching
- Special seating is made available
- Special support provided by faculty

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the process.

The students are required to furnish a detailed Biodata to the tutor from which information regarding her academic performance, family context, skills etc. are obtained. A primary identification as advanced and slow learners is made from the Entry level test conducted by Departments and academic record provided by the students. An Orientation Programme /Bridge Course is conducted for the newly admitted students. A programme on Communication skills in English is offered to the required students.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/ Remedial/ Add on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.)

There are various strategies deployed to bridge the knowledge gap. Bridge courses are offered by various Departments to first year undergraduates to make them familiar with the new concepts and respective subject areas.

Remedial coaching is given to slow learners. Classes are given outside regular teaching schedules. Additional simplified notes, frequent test papers, viva questions or practical classes are provided for the uplift of slow learners. Under the New Initiatives in Higher Education of Government of Kerala, the College with support of KSHEC has adopted Scholar Support Programme (SSP) for providing remedial coaching for the slow learners. College offers various UGC sponsored Add on Courses, Certificate Programmes and Skill Enhancement Programmes for enhancing the knowledge and ensure employability skills.

Enrichment Programmes like Walk with Scholar (WWS), Value Education, Life Skill Development Course for the Final Year students, Annual Retreats, Personality Development and Stress Management seminars etc. are organized for the benefit of all the students.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Our College being a Women's College, gender issues are given prime importance. To sensitize women about their status, identity and role, the College has established a Women Cell which organizes gender sensitization programmes awareness classes etc. The aim of the Cell is to promote awareness and active response among women to social issues and bring out their full potential as resources for their own development and that of the nation. The Women Cell functions in the College since 1995-96. Besides the activities of the Cell, the College also responds to social issues related to women. Talks by eminent personalities like Smt Dayabhai (Social Worker),Smt Sreelekha IPS, Smt. Sara Joseph (Malayalam Writer), Smt. M.S Jaya IAS (District Collector) and Smt. Sobhana (Deputy Director of Collegiate Education) motivated and enlightened the students. Students also respond actively to issues



concerning gender. Protest rally was organised to convey the solidarity of the College with the victim of Delhi gang rape in December 2012. Alumnae members also take classes and conduct debates on gender sensitization. Women cell organised a one day short documentary film fest *Sneham* to provide an awareness on gender issues.

The College admits students from diverse social, economic and cultural backgrounds and does not discriminate against any category on the basis of religion, caste or creed. A uniform dress code is prescribed and students are not permitted to wear gold or gold like ornaments so as to minimize the diverse social and economic status of the students. Mobile phones are banned in the campus. Students are encouraged to help out each other both financially and academically. The differently abled students too are specially monitored and assisted and are given opportunities to help them feel one with the community. The University of Calicut has included a Compulsory Social Service Scheme of 42 days social service work to be completed by each UG student for the successful completion of the UG Programme.

The College has a Bhoomitrasena Club which organises various programmes to provide awareness on conservation of nature and natural resources. The Departments organize various programmes for ensuring awareness about current environmental issues through films, exhibitions, talks and competitions on various environmental topics.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified through interactive classroom teaching and classroom discussions and continuous evaluations. In the current academic year, the College has initiated Walk with Scholar Programme with support of KSHEC for catering to the needs of advanced learners. Five faculty members under a Coordinator mentor 30 students of first year UG programmes. Faculty of the Departments also takes initiatives in mentoring other students. Various extension lectures are organized to foster learning needs of advanced learners. They are constantly encouraged and guided for preparation of various competitions. They are also encouraged to participate in symposiums, paper and poster presentations, and quiz contests. Advanced learners are assigned as Peer Team Leaders. They are motivated to take classes and seminars for slow learners. In Microbiology and Botany Departments, microbial pure cultures for laboratory experiments are revived, subcultured and maintained by these students.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The interaction during the admission procedure with the Principal throws light on their varied backgrounds, skills and capabilities. The information so received is



conveyed to the tutors who take necessary action. The students who are at the risk of drop out are identified through personal interaction by respective departments and they are given counselling. Remedial teaching is provided to help them overcome their problems, after identifying their areas of difficulty. Scholar Support Programme is initiated in the current academic year to uplift the slow learners. Five teachers under a Coordinator provide academic support to 50 students. Personal support and care is given to the married students to continue their studies. Counselling is provided to the parents on the importance of their wards completing the programme. Financial support and freeships are provided by the institution to the economically weaker students. Physically challenged students are provided appropriate support according to the nature of disability.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The University provides an academic calendar to the institution at the beginning of every academic year. It includes the number of working days, holidays, schedule of semester, internal assessment schedule and so on, which is incorporated into the academic calendar of the College. Calendar Committee of the College prepares the College Calendar and Handbook in consultation with the Principal and Vice Principal.

The Principal in consultation with the Vice-Principal and Office Superintendent prepares the annual work distribution for the staff. The coordinators and the members meet as required and monitor the functions and activities of the Cells, Forums, Committees, and Clubs etc.

The Timetable Committee prepares a general timetable for the entire College and assigns periods for core, common, complementary courses, value education, and tutorial and association activities along with the room number for these activities.

The main agenda for the first Council meeting, Staff meeting, Departmental Staff meeting, IQAC and others is the setting of action plan for the year. At the Departmental level, the Head of the Department in consultation with the faculty chalks out a schedule of activities for the entire academic year and evaluates the activities, programmes and performance of the previous year. Subsequent meetings evaluate the work done so far.

Each faculty is provided a Teachers' Diary in which the monthly Teaching Plan is prepared. The departmental meetings and activities, evaluation duties, Seminars/ Workshops attended, leave taken etc are recorded.

The Examination Committee coordinates the internal exams of all the Departments. Examination Time Table is set in advance and intimated to the students sufficiently early. The University examination is scheduled according to the decisions of the University.

2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?



IQAC improves the teaching-learning process by

- Organizing training programmes on relevant computer-aided teaching and econtent development
- Motivating faculty members periodically to attend programs on new and emerging technologies
- Providing access to computers and free internet facility to the faculty and students
- Organizing Workshops on ICT based pedagogical skills to make the staff proficient in the use of ICT based tools and enhance teaching-learning process
- Getting feedback on teachers to assure the quality of teaching and learning.
- Motivating Departments to organize educational tours to make teachinglearning more student-centric
- Organising Seminars/Annual Endowment lectures on topics of relevance
- Directing Departments to initiate Certificate Courses and Skill Enhancement Courses
- Proposing new Programmes, inter departmental activities, community extension programmes etc.
- Conducting Orientation on College and its activities to the new entrants.

The IQAC does the academic audit of all Departments annually to ensure documentation and evaluation of activities. It also suggests programmes that can be included in the Department to cater to student support, extension service or academic excellence. The IQAC organized a National Level Seminar on 'Quality Enhancement in Higher Education through Student Support and Progression' on 2-3 March 2012. The session was inaugurated by Dr. Ann Mary Fernandez, Reader, Karunya University. The Seminar included exclusive sessions for faculty, students and parents. An interesting module in the Seminar was a session exclusively for students' paper presentations. Another National Level Seminar sponsored by NAAC on "Recent Trends in Higher Education: Scope and Challenges in Governance" was conducted on 26th Sept 2014. Eminent personalities in the field of education like Sri. T P Sreenivasan, Vice Chairman KSHEC, Prof M.Y. Jayaraj, Professor of Microbiology, Gulburga University, Dr Mohandas B Menon, Vice Chancellor, Wawasan University, Malaysia, Prof M. P. Ishak, Deputy Director of Collegiate Education, Thrissur and Sri. Sijo Kuruvilla, Director Board Member, Start-up Village Kochi, were the resource persons for the Seminar.

2.3.3. How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Learning is made more student-centric by laying stress on specific learning outcomes for all courses and making it more participatory and interactive through the following group activities like Group discussions, Field survey/Field work, Role Play and Academic Debate which while strengthening the knowledge base contribute to skill formation and managerial skills both at personal and interpersonal level. The Departments organize Quiz, Debate and various competitions. Clubs organize activities to facilitate the creative and academic pursuits of the students individually



and collectively. Departments organize co-curricular and cultural events like quiz, poster-making, manuscript preparation, elocution competitions, paper-presentations, debates, Magazine-designing, Creative Writing, Debates and Poetry competitions that help students in chiselling out their personality.

The College has 14 Smart class rooms, Computer labs with internet facility, OHPs, Multipurpose lab with Language Lab facility and seminar halls to develop interactive skills. It is mandatory for all students to prepare assignments and present seminars based on their curriculum and they are encouraged to present research level papers in seminars and symposia. A Research Forum for PG students functions in the College to inculcate research culture. A Journal Club is active in the Department of Microbiology and Botany where students take up interesting and latest research articles and present it.

Interactive and collaborative learning is encouraged through peer teaching, group discussions, group projects, group assignments, library hours, interdepartmental competitions, association activities, study tours, seminars, symposiums, discussions, debates, and so on. Independent learning is encouraged through oral questioning, class tests, individual assignments, paper presentations, competitions etc. The Tutorial and Mentoring system addresses the individual student's need.

The College has a well-equipped and well managed library. ICT is increasingly incorporated into the teaching learning exercise. Teachers are encouraged to take part in workshops, training programmes and seminars that are intended to improve their professional skills.

The peaceful and calm ambience in the campus with absolutely no unrest, political or otherwise is ideal for the knowledge building. Teacher performance evaluation is obtained through student feedback, parent feedback, alumnae feedback, employer feedback, etc.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The institution nurtures critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper through the following activities organised by the College and the Departments. Various programmes include Seminars, Exhibitions, Quiz Competitions, Invited Talks, Film Reviews, Day Celebration, Industrial Visit, Field Trip and Nature Camp, Environment Month Celebration, Science Day Celebration, Fests, Fairs, Projects, Visit to Research Institution, Power Point/Paper Presentation Competitions, Publications, Consultancy Services, Surveys, Mini Projects, Blood Donation Camps, Research motivation talks, Weekly Bulletin Boards, Visits to Libraries, Study Tour to Historical Places, Fink Club, Financial Literacy Cell, Manuscript Magazine Competition, Book Mark Competition, Best Journalist Competition, Meet the Author Programme, Wonder Woman Contest and so on.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National



Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Science laboratories and the Computer Science laboratories are well equipped with modern teaching aids. There are well equipped Seminar Halls, Smart Classrooms and an Auditorium. Internet and INFLIBNET facility is available to the staff and students. Innovative practices in pedagogy in addition to the lecture method are being used to assure and enhance our academic quality. The following teaching aids are adopted in addition to the lecture method:

- Smart class Rooms
- Computer Aided Learning through audio visual aids is provided to supplement lectures in classroom
- Multipurpose Computer lab with language lab facility is available
- Movies/ Documentaries related to the syllabi are shown.
- INFLIBNET facility for online access to e-materials is available

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Students and faculty are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills through the following methods.

- Seminars/ Workshops/ Talks are organized
- Extension lectures by experts in their respective fields to share their knowledge with students
- Interface with eminent writers, poets, social workers, research fellows
- Group Discussions and Seminars
- Exposing students to industrial environment through industrial visits and industrial training.
- Interdisciplinary programmes are organized
- Student participation in symposium/seminar conducted by the College and other institutions

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

A group of around 20-25 students is assigned to a tutor. Every Monday time is allotted for tutorial. Mentoring is done by all teachers as and according to the requirement. If the situation requires the support and cooperation of the parents or family, they are also summoned. In addition to tutorial and mentoring, services of two professional counsellors are also available in the campus.

2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution



to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Innovative teaching methods have been adopted by the faculty to boost the capacity to learn and to teach meaningful application of knowledge to young minds. The College encourages the faculty to complement the academic system with practical skills through various teaching methodologies that extend beyond the classroom. Activities undertaken include:

- Power Point Presentations and use of internet to make teaching-learning more interactive and interesting
- Field trips and Educational trips
- Visits to industries
- National Seminars organized
- Workshops and extension lectures by scholars and subject experts
- Hands-on work experience in almost all the practical subjects are integrated into the academic agenda
- ICT based teaching methods are used
- Feedback on faculty obtained from students
- Power point presentations and Seminar presentations by students
- Internship for M Sc Psychology students
- Additional coaching for slow learners
- 14 Smart class rooms introduced

2.3.8 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library caters to the needs of teachers and students by providing access to books and journals. There is a separate section for Reference Books. Text books and CD ROMs are maintained in separate shelves. Books for Competitive Examinations are issued to the students. E-resources are available through N-LIST of INFLIBNET services. The Librarian helps the Departments to purchase the latest books and journals as per the requirement of the teachers. There is open access to the library, which is fully automated with LIBSOFT.

2.3.9 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- Internal examinations, assignments, seminars, projects, viva voce and a vast syllabus need to be completed in a short span of time in the semester system. The fulfillment of these prescribed activities in the given time is a challenge for the faculty. The vast syllabus leaves little time for extracurricular and extension activities.
- Delay in the conduct of examinations by the University is another challenge faced.



• Another threat is the large number of guest faculty in the institution who may quit the job at any point of time.

The Institution has internalized the practices of ensuring curriculum completion within the planned time frame. It involves a well-prepared College Calendar for the entire year and strict adherence to both College Calendar and the University Calendar. The institution is planning the academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities according to the prepared Calendar. Extra classes are taken to complete the curriculum within the prescribed time frame. Great pains are taken to schedule the co-curricular and extracurricular activities so that students do not miss out on these.

2.3.10 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

A systematic feedback mechanism has been developed to ensure and enhance the quality of teaching learning. Feedback on teachers is obtained from students to assure quality in teaching learning. The feedback obtained is analyzed and the teachers are counselled to improve academic standards. Workshops are organized to upgrade the teaching skills in view of the technological advancement and the role of IT in enhancing the quality of higher education. The internal assessment and continuous evaluation system helps to identify slow learners and take necessary steps like extra coaching for such students to improve their studies.

Additional feedback is obtained through Opinion boxes, Tutorials, Staff meetings, Council meetings and IQAC meetings.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the College in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

All faculty positions are filled as per the norms laid down by the UGC, State Government and University. Any vacancy arising in the institution is widely publicized by open advertisement in 4 leading newspapers and through our website. Eligible candidates are shortlisted on the basis of UGC guidelines and invited for personal interview. Selection is based on their merit, research experience and their performance in personal interview by a Selection Committee comprising of competent representatives from University, State Government and Management. Highly qualified and meritorious candidates with a good research potential are appointed to give a boost to research activities. When appointing new faculty, demands of the curriculum are taken into account and faculty who have exposure in emerging/interdisciplinary areas are appointed. Due to the excellent reputation of the Institution in academics, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, sound infrastructure, student and staff support systems and comfortable working atmosphere, College has no difficulty in retaining appointed staff.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

To cope with the growing demand of qualified senior faculty a multipronged approach is adopted. In the first instance faculty are encouraged to attend seminars, symposium and workshops to keep abreast of the emerging areas. The College also appoints additional faculty to teach new/ specialized programmes like Biotechnology and I.T., on regular/contractual basis as per Government and University norms. Qualified faculty is also invited on part time basis for certain modules like bioinformatics. The College welcomes human resources from other institutions to ensure diversity in academic input. Memorandum of Understanding is undertaken by our institution with specialized institution of repute like Chetana Media Institute, Thrissur so that our students get the benefit of their senior faculty.

Departmental Initiatives to equip faculty

In an effort to equip the faculty of the College, Departments encourage the faculty to attend seminars and workshops on various topics. The seminars/workshops enable faculty to get an insight on the emerging areas of the discipline and provide enhanced knowledge on the subject. The achievements of the faculty are highly appreciated by the management. At the beginning of each academic year, College Management arranges an Orientation for the spiritual and personal development of the faculty. The College Management strives to promote professional development of faculty by encouraging the faculty to apply for various research grants available from various agencies like UGC, DST, and KSCSTE etc. Encouragement is also given to pursue M. Phil. and Ph. D. The institution issues them 'No Objection Certificate' on request. The faculties are motivated to attend General Orientation Courses, Refresher Courses, Training Programmes, Conferences, Seminars and Workshops. They are also encouraged to publish papers in Journals and present papers in seminars and workshops. The institution also conducts seminars, workshops and special lectures for the benefit of



its faculty and students. In the period the Institution and Departments have organized 13 National Seminars for the benefit of faculty and students.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards/recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed



to such performance/achievement of the faculty. -

The institution encourages a culture of excellence. The faculties are given positions of responsibility in various committees to develop their leadership quality. Management also arranges talks by eminent personalities and orientation programmes for development of the staff. In 2014, Dr. Josepheni Joseph, Associate Professor& Head, Department of English and IQAC Coordinator was Awarded 'SADGURU' Award for Best Teacher instituted by University of Calicut. She was selected for the award based on teacher performance evaluation done by students, and the College Council.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

- ➤ College Management conducts a confidential student evaluation of teachers. This evaluation helps teachers to understand their strengths and weaknesses and helps the Institution to maintain the quality of its academic programmes.
- Internal audit of the departments is conducted by the Principal and IQAC. Based on these evaluations and the suggestions offered, all departments draw up their action plan for the following year and submit it to the Principal for approval. As a result of this, a number of new and innovative programmes have been implemented by all the departments.
- ➤ The tutorial system also helps students express their opinion on all aspects, especially that of teaching-learning.
- ➤ The College also follows the annual self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty. A self-evaluation goes a long way in introspecting the accomplishments and inadequacies of the faculty.
- ➤ The College also gets formal and informal feedback from the alumnae. Every year, January 26th is observed as Alumnae Reunion Day, and members give their feedback on the academic output and other campus experience, and its impact on their career and life situations.
- ➤ An Exit Survey by the outgoing students is conducted at the end of the programme.
- ➤ Parent/Guardian feedback is also collected through a structured questionnaire and personal interaction at the Parent Teacher Association Meeting.
- Employer's feedback is collected from the organizations that have employed students from the College through a structured questionnaire.
- An Opinion box has been placed at three distinct spots for students to drop their complaints and suggestions. The data thus collected is analyzed and discussed by Grievance Redressal Cell and further action is taken at Council meetings and staff meetings.



➤ The entire feedback system is institutionalized and is conducted at the end of every year and documented. All stakeholders are aware of this exercise for they are all involved in it in one way or the other.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

At the beginning of every academic year the faculty and students are intimated to them through the University academic calendar as well as the College Calendar. Weightage of each component of assessment i.e. attendance, assignment, seminar and internals are conveyed to the students both personally through the tutorial session and collectively through the College Website, Notice Board etc. A common Orientation Programme for the freshers is also organized. The parents are kept informed of the same through the periodical Parent Teacher Association Meetings.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The University has stipulated minimum grade for internal assessment. A retest is conducted for those students who are unable to attend (sports/health/genuine personal reasons) or secure minimum grade in the internal examination so that the students do not have to lose an academic year. University has also stipulated minimum attendance required for the course. Any shortfall in attendance is brought to the notice of students by displaying their names on the notice board/ informing them personally. In the current academic year, university has replaced a five point scale by a seven point scale for effective evaluation.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The CCSS system was introduced for UG and PG Programmes in 2009 and 2010 respectively. CCSS involves continuous evaluation through two internal exams, assignment, seminars, and project and semester exam conducted by the University at the end of each semester. In the current academic year, the University has reduced the percentage of internal mark from 25 to 20 for the UG programmes. The University has stipulated two internal examinations for all programmes, the dates for which are notified by the University to the College. The internal assessments include two tests, seminar, assignment, and attendance. The College Council discusses the date, duration and conduct of the internal tests, and also the date for the announcement of results. The result is conveyed to the parents through the progress report, which the parents/guardians are expected to sign in person. Records of both internal and external exam results are maintained by the Departments for all programmes. The internal weightage is calculated according to the University direction and is sent to the



University online. The consolidated marks are displayed on the student notice board for verification before being submitted to the University. All the faculty members are involved in the external evaluation like invigilation, centralized and home valuation of answer scripts, external examiner for practicals and Viva Voce etc.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Two internal examinations, seminar, and assignment provide continuous and consistent measurement of student progress. The individual teacher also makes use of other measures like question-answer session, brain storming, quizzing, discussing and debating on the portions taught. Students are encouraged to make power point presentations for their seminars. Based on their performance, remedial coaching and tutorial sessions are given to slow learners. Any loss in teaching days due to unforeseen circumstances are compensated through special classes so that the syllabus is completed on time and ensuring that the students prepare well for their exams.

The goal of summative assessment is to evaluate student learning at the end of an instructional unit. Summative assessments are often high stakes, which means that they have a high point value. In the current year the value ascribed to summative assessment in the UG programme has been raised from 75% to 80%. Summative Assessment takes place at the end of the academic session. It is conducted by the University at the end of the semester. Students are evaluated depending up on Written Exams, Practical Exams, Viva voce and Project work

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The institution evaluates the subject knowledge of the students through two internal tests, class tests, seminars and assignments. Communication skills and ability to use modern methods of presentation like Power Point is also assessed. Practical Skill of the students is also evaluated. The whole evaluation process is transparent. The evaluated answer books are returned to the students and they may approach the teacher concerned for any corrections. Consolidated internal marks are displayed on the notice board for a week before being submitted online to the University. Students may also use the facility of the Grievance Redressal Cell if their grievances are not solved satisfactorily at the Departmental level. To assess the English communicative skills of the students, Department of English assesses Spoken English skill of all students as a part of internal assessment of the compulsory Common English Course. To encourage independent learning, students are asked to submit individual assignments which are evaluated as a part of continuous assessment. Though the internal assessment does not involve the behaviour assessment, the best student of each Department is recognized and nominated for the Gem of St. Mary's Contest. There are prizes for best NSS and NCC volunteer.

The institution ensures through value education, academic seminars, orientations, life guidance programmes, participation in Institutional Social Responsibility that a graduate has the following attributes

- Moral and Spiritual Integrity

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The college ensures full transparency in the process of evaluation. At the college level there is provision for re-totaling and re-evaluation. However, grievance if any is redressed by the Grievance Redressal Committee. Matters associated with University results including withheld results, grades published wrongly etc. are solved by communicating with the University and getting redressed. The University has specified procedure for addressing complaints regarding evaluation. Students have the option to apply for revaluation of external examinations.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The learning outcomes of the College are clearly defined in its Vision and Mission. As they are displayed in strategic locations in the College, all the students and staff are aware of it. The learning outcome is also emphasized during the orientation program given to staff and students at the beginning of every academic year.

Intellectual integrity on the part of all students is basic to individual growth and we encourage students to strive for academic excellence by cultivating intellectual integrity and honesty. The College grooms young women to be agents of love, justice and peace through love of God, pursuit of knowledge, moral integrity and social responsibility. Thus they are sensitive to the needs of environment and society at large. In a multicultural country like India, where people belonging to different faiths coexist in harmony, St. Marians are encouraged to promote religious harmony and national integration. Appropriate to the level of study and discipline, each programme is designed to ensure that students achieve the desired learning outcomes.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme



/coursewise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes /courses offered.

The institution does the comprehensive evaluation of the students by regular tests, assignment and seminars, internal assessment grades are awarded based on their performance and students are given remedial coaching if needed. Gifted learners are promoted by providing additional study material and guidance for the effective use of library resources. Our institution strives to maintain good academic record. Recently due to the proliferation of Professional Colleges in Kerala, the entry level proficiency of the students who opt for the science stream have decreased thus impacting the output of these courses.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The College has a well-developed mechanism to monitor the student's learning outcomes. At the beginning of the year all the departments hold a departmental staff meeting and chart out the time table for the upcoming semester. Assignments and Seminars by the individual students are also allotted in the beginning so that students get ample time to prepare these. Faculties make use of Power Point to make their classes more interesting.



Attendance is taken every hour and any shortage in attendance is brought to the notice of the concerned student, and parent is also informed of the same during PTA meetings and over the phone. If any fall in attendance of a student is noticed, the tutor personally interacts with the student and parents to assess the problem and suggest remedial measures if needed. The class tests and assignments are valued within a short duration and the marks are recorded and displayed on the notice board. The same is also communicated to the parents.

Motivated and willing students are also encouraged to be peer teachers to their friends so that slow learners have additional help to improve their grade. All students have access to counseling center in the College so that any problems /issues that may affect their performance can be discussed with the counselor in a stress free and confidential manner.

Students are encouraged to make use of the excellent library and internet facility available in college. The faculty members also conduct surprise tests and quiz to monitor the academic progress of each student. Student achievers are lauded and their achievements are recognized on Prathibha Day, College Day, Toppers Day, Sports Day, Departmental Association Meetings etc. The learning outcome is also assessed through student progression.

2.6.4 What are the measures /initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

To enhance the employability of the students and to improve their skills all the Departments offer Certificate Courses which also serve to enrich, enhance and supplement the syllabus prescribed by the University. In addition to this, College also offers UGC sponsored Add on Courses and Skill Enhancement Courses that help in the holistic development of the student. These new-age programmes have a well-charted curriculum and are taught by well qualified faculty, in a very conducive environment.

All the students have to submit a project as a part of their undergraduate and post graduate programme. This helps students to develop independent and critical thinking thus enhancing their research aptitudes. Research Forum is also active in this regard and arranges talks by eminent/upcoming researchers so that students are motivated to take up research. Students are also taken to various research institutions so that they are aware of the various opportunities in research field. College also conducts large number of seminars in emerging areas giving our students opportunity to interact with eminent personalities in their respective field. The college celebrates National Science Day every year with Talks, Seminars, and various competitions to inculcate in our students a scientific temper.

College through various clubs and forums also provide our students an opportunity to develop organizational and leadership skills and mould them into citizens capable of responding to the needs of our time in a holistic manner. Extension activities also help to generate awareness about the need to choose an environmentally sound sustainable solution to everyday problems. It also orients students towards various social issues of the day.



The Career Guidance Cell has been very effective in giving necessary career guidance and in developing the personality of those who seek employment. A wide variety of talks, interactive sessions and seminars were conducted during the period.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

After the completion of each class test / internal examination, a departmental meeting is held in which all the faculty, present the grades obtained by the students. The results are discussed and slow learners are identified. The concerned tutor personally interacts with the slow learners to identify barriers to learning like faulty study habits, lack of motivation, language barriers etc. Special attention is given to these students and remedial measures are taken. Peer teaching and personal doubt clearing sessions, tutorials, answering the previous year's question papers, providing question bank, specially prepared notes etc. are some of the strategies used to overcome barriers of learning.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

At the beginning of each academic year departmental meetings are held wherein the learning outcome to be achieved that year are discussed. Advanced learners are motivated towards academic excellence by various means- provision of extra reading material, extra questions/problems for additional practice, seminars and assignments on varied topics and so on. They are encouraged to be peer teachers to slow learners and thus enhance their communication skills. Slow learners are also encouraged to overcome their learning barriers. The results of internal examination/assignment/seminars have to be submitted to the Head of the Department and Principal, so as to facilitate periodic assessment and corrective action if required.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Both individual teachers and institution use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. Depending on the outcome of various assessment methods, slow learners and advanced learners are identified and they are provided with support and encouragement. Feedback from students and other stakeholders help in identifying any gap in curriculum delivery and corrections if needed are implemented.

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

The Research Centre of the Department of Mathematics affiliated to the University of Calicut was established in 2011. Five research scholars do research under two research guides, Dr. Sr. Magie Jose and Dr. Parvathy K.S.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

The Research Committee constituted in 2005 following the first NAAC accreditation promotes research culture in the faculty and students. The Research Committee includes the Principal, the Vice Principal, and faculty representatives of PG departments. The Research Committee played an important role in getting the Research Centre of the Department of Mathematics sanctioned by the University. The



Committee coordinates the research activities of the College. Research Committee initiated the establishment of a Research Forum that takes care of the research activities of students.

- Encourage faculty and students to do research which is of benefit to the community
- Instill research culture among students through their UG and PG projects.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

Autonomy to the principal investigator

The principal investigators are given complete freedom to pursue research for projects. There is complete autonomy right from the preparation of the proposal to the publication of results. They can avail of the infrastructure and human resources available in the College. They can also provide opportunities for students involvement in the research ventures. Timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate is encouraged by the Management and Research Committees.

Timely availability or release of resources

The Principal encourages the faculty to enhance their qualifications. Information regarding research schemes, projects and funding is put up on staff notice board. The efficient administration provides for timely submission of research project proposals, seminar proposals and FDP applications. Resources are released without any delay so as to encourage the research aspirations of the faculty. The College Journal provides an opportunity for the faculty to publish their research papers.

Adequate infrastructure and human resources

The Mathematics Research Department has a separate centre with separate cabin for each research scholar and a computer lab with internet facility for doing research. The existing facilities in the Department of Botany is adequate for the research being carried out now. But more infrastructure and human resources are required for establishing more research centers.

Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc.to teachers

There is no provision of leave from duty or reduced work load for the faculty engaged in research as per Government rules. Duty leave is granted to faculty for attending seminars and conferences.

Support in terms of technology and information needs

INFLIBNET is available to the faculty and students of the College. Internet facility is also available in the library and all the departments. Half an hour of free internet facility is available to all students and free internet facility is made available to PG students on all Saturdays.



Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities

The institution is very prompt in facilitating timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the authorities.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

A Research Forum functions under the Research Committee to promote research culture in the students. The Research Forum meets once a month and PG students present research papers. Faculty and students are encouraged to take up projects which will enhance their research aptitude. Talks, Seminars and Workshops are organized to develop a scientific temper in students. Students are also encouraged to participate and present papers in seminars/workshops organized by other institutions. The college has a good library and INFLIBNET facility to enhance research in students. The Department Associations and Forums organize talks and exhibitions on topics of current relevance to inculcate scientific spirit and research aptitude. The IQAC organizes a Paper Presentation Competition for PG students in connection with Dr. Sr. Rani George Endowment Lecture every year. Demonstration of experiments and visit to research institutions are arranged to motivate students to take up research.

3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual / collaborative research activity etc.)

All the faculty in the main Departments are actively involved in guiding student projects. An average of three to six student projects are carried out under the supervision of the faculty who acts as their guide. Fourteen of our faculty are engaged in carrying out UGC minor research projects. Faculty of the Department of Botany supervise the projects of students of other Departments and institutions. Faculty and students carry out research work and projects in reputed institutions and industries inside and outside the State.

The College management is not in a position to offer sabbatical leave as it is not in agreement with the Kerala state higher education rules. But the faculty are encouraged to take FDP leave to do M Phil and PhD. The faculty are also encouraged to do M Phil and PhD in the distance mode and on a Part time mode.

3.1.10 Initiatives to Create Awareness/ Advocate/Transfer Research Findings (Lab to Land)

One of the major ways in which the public is made aware of the research contribution and their impact on the land and the society is through the seminars organised by the various departments of the College. The minor project of the faculty have also had practical application in the society. In addition to these a few major initiatives of lab to land transfer have been done by departments. The Department of Botany in collaboration with Oushadi is maintaining a medicinal garden containing more than five hundred of species of medicinal plants and orientation programmes are organized as a part of this project to make the public aware of the uses of medicinal plants and the preparation of herbal home remedies. The Medicinal garden maintained by the Department of Botany of the college was commented as an excellent herbal garden by Ousadhi. Sr. Dr. Meena K Cheruvathur of the Department of Botany has developed tissue culture protocols for the rapid invitro multiplication of eight red listed ethno medicinal plants from the Western Ghats. The research findings of most of the teachers involved in the research are of immense use for the society and the nation.

The Departments of Social Sciences and Languages organized a seminar on the history, economics, society, culture and sports arena of the city and the IQAC organised a National Seminar "Quality Enhancement in Higher Education through Student Support and Progression" funded by the management. The Management provided financial loan for a NAAC sponsored National Seminar on "Recent Trends in Higher Education Policies: Scope and Challenges in Governance" organized by IQAC. The research journal "Annals of Basic and Applied Sciences" published annually is funded by the Management. The staff and students who are sent for faculty development and research seminars organized by other Institutions are provided the travel and registration fee expenses by the Management.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The Departments forward their requests for expansion of infrastructure and upgradation of equipment to the Principal who in consultation with the Governing Body, Education Committee and Local Management Committee sanctions the same when required. The Institution utilizes grants from the UGC to upgrade the library and laboratories. In the Post Re Accreditation period, PG labs, for MSc Psychology MSc Botany, MSc Chemistry, Microbiology Project Lab and a Tissue Culture Lab were set up to meet the demands of the new programmes introduced. The Departments also utilize the minor project grants for buying the required equipment. When the institution applies for new courses especially those which need laboratories, it has already decided positively in favour of setting up the laboratories needed. Once the programmes are introduced the College takes the initiative to set up the required labs as quickly as possible.

The institution has received UGC grants, grants from KSCSTE for augmenting

INFLIBNET facility in available to all the researchers and the students of the College. Microbiology and Botany laboratories are used by researchers from the college and other institutions. The Tissue Culture Lab provides facility for research in Tissue Culture Multiplication.

3.5 Consultancy

In the last five years the College has realized the urgent need for interaction with the industry for providing practical knowledge to the students. So in addition to the industrial visits which have become part of College tradition for a long time the College is promoting a greater involvement of the industry in academics of the institution. The Department of Botany collaborates with Oushadi, the largest manufacturer of ayurvedic medicines in public sector who have been providing medicinal plants as well as financial assistance for the last three years.PG students are encouraged to do research in industry. Talks and Seminars are organized from time to time to provide awareness on the need for academic industry interaction. As industrial collaboration is mandatory in the 2 B Voc programmes introduced in this academic year MOUs have been signed with Wi3 Solutions Thrissur and e-icon Solutions, Thrissur for sharing infrastructural facilities and equipment of these industries .These industries will also provide resource persons and placement services.

The Consultancy Cell was constituted in 2012-13 to promote consultancy in the institution. Though the Departments had been doing free consultancy at the time of the re accreditation in 2010, paid consultancy was introduced in select departments in last five years. Though much publicity is not given, the public come to know of the consultancy work through the stakeholders and the beneficiaries.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood- community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The College has a long tradition of commitment to the society and the community around. It is this urge to provide benefit to the society that led to the formation of Social Service League in 1951. The Social Service League established a crèche, nursery and a tailoring unit at Nadathara to empower the women and children of the Panchayat. The Kerala State Social welfare Board has been providing financial assistance for the same for the past 36 years. Due to managerial problems the College has decided to shift the crèche, nursery and tailoring unit to a locality close to the



institution. In 2013 the College adopted St Mary's Convent U.P School, Chiyyaram and sponsored 40 underprivileged children of the School. The College monitors the development of these children during the sponsorship period and provides remedial classes and organize 3 day summer training camp for them. An amount of Rs. 20000 is spent each year solely for providing study kit for 40 students of St Mary's C.U.P School. The College has a very active NSS comprising of two units and they have been working towards the goal of social and community upliftment in a variety of A Computer -literate society is the ideal for which the Department of Computer Science is working and they have taken an oath on 2nd Dec 2013 to provide the light of computer knowledge to 13 communities. The target group includes students and parents of students of BRC Ollur, Ammasangham members of Lourde Forane Church, laboratory, office and guest ministerial staff of St Mary's College, students of St. Mary's C.U.P. School Chiyyaram, students and teachers of Pope John L.P.S. Kuriachira, parents of SSA unit Thrissur, students of St. Annes C.H.S. Thrissur, and students of Govt. Nursing School, Thrissur. The Department of English has started an Organ Donation Awareness Programme 'Santhwana Sparsham 'to create awareness in the students and the faculty on the need for organ donation and to enlist willing donors into the programme. The 'Vatsalyam' project of the Department of Economics provides financial and material help to the poor and the needy. The Department of Economics has initiated a Help Desk which lends assistances in filling up very important forms like widow pension form to the under privileged and illiterate. In collaboration with the IMA the Department of Biotechnology has been organizing a Blood Donation Camp every year for the past 9 years.

The Department of History is very active in in the field of pain and palliative care. The NSS and NCC students act as volunteers for important public function and programme outside and inside the College. To ensure a clean and healthy environment for all, the College has started a cleanliness drive "L'Aria Fresca -Clean Campus Clean City". As part of Compulsory Social Service and the quest for service to humanity, students of different departments visit old age homes, serve inmates in hospitals and so on. With the introduction of the BSW Programme this year the community extension activities of the institution have received momentum and has already resulted in an MoU with Kolazhy Panchayat for adopting and making Kolazhy Panchayat a child friendly Panchayat.

The Community extension activities are organised by the departments various clubs, forums and cells under the leadership of the concerned Tutors and Coordinators. Hence tracking the student involvement in various community oriented activities is not difficult. Records and details of programmes and student involvement is maintained.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicits take holder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?



The annual feedback from the different state holders provide the institution with a perception of the overall performance and quality of the institution. The feedbacks are analyzed and measures are taken to remedy the drawbacks if any and improve the quality of the institution. The high demand ratio is the evidence for the excellent rating of the overall performance of the College in the community.

The Management has a practice of devoting 20 percent of the salary of the sister staff for the noble cause of serving the society. Faculty and students are actively involved in all the extension activities. Active and vibrant human resource provided is the major resource for the extension. The extension and outreach activities develop volunteer service, commitment to society, oneness and unity, ethical values, self-esteem and self confidence in the students.

To achieve these objectives the College has implemented a number of extension and outreach programmes according to the need of the times. In the last four years too. The College has been backed by the local community in all her endeavors. MLA fund of Rs.3,78,000 was given to the College for buying 10 Smart (interactive) Boards. A Student Welfare Fund of Rs.1,51,250 was constituted with sponsorships and participation from all the stakeholders and well-wishers of the local community as a part of the Monsoon fest 2014. In 2012-13, Staff, Students and Management have contributed an amount of Rs.488000 towards the building of house for a deserving person. The College Magazine is published every year with financial support from the well-wishers of the local community. Many of the Scholarships and Prizes for the students have been instituted by the patrons of the institution. The local community and NGOs are involved in other extension activities of the institution. The cleaning of the well in Chembukavu was done with the sanction and aid of the Thrissur Corporation. - One simple project in each programming language in every semester.
- Industry internship in summer vacation
- Project at the end of every year with the help of industrialists
- Industrial visit each year to reputed industries
- Placements for all eligible students
- Extension of resources of the industries to the students.



An MoU has been signed with two industries namely Wi3 solutions, Thrissur for B.Voc in Software Development and e-icon solutions, Thrissur for B.Voc in Multimedia course regarding their terms and conditions.

3.7.5 How many of the linkages/collaborations have actually resulted in formal MoUs and agreements? List out the activities and beneficiaries and cite examples (if any) of the established linkages that enhanced and/or facilitated

a) Curriculum development/enrichment

The Department of English has signed an MoU with Chetana Media Institute by which resource person from Chetana Media Institute will provide practical and theory classes on media to B.A English students who have Journalism and Audio Visual communication as their complementary courses. MoUs have been signed with Wi 3 solution, Thrissur and e-icon solution, Thrissur. Interacting and sharing of resources with these industries for the transaction of the curriculum of the 2 B.Voc Courses introduced this year.

b) Internship/On-the-job training

MoUs with Wi3 solutions, Thrissur and e-icon solution, Thrissur have resulted in an agreement for providing internship for the B.Voc students in their industries. The Department of Psychology has linkage with Amala Cancer Hospital for internship of the Psychology students. Linkages with the industries and research institutes have resulted industrial visits to these industries and institutes.

c) Summer placement

College is yet to initiate summer placement programmes. However students are motivated for work during summer vacation as part of Earn While You Learn



d) Faculty exchange and professional development

Many of the Linkages, Collaboration and MoUs have resulted in expert and extension lecturers by faculty from other institutions.

e) Research

Nine of our Faculty are involved in PhD research. Fourteen are pursuing minor research projects with the support of UGC. Projects are carried out with assistance of KSCSTE. Dr. Regi Raphael K. of the Department of Botany in a research guide under Bharathiar University and her research scholar is doing research leading to Ph. D in the Department lab of the College.

f) Consultancy

Faculty of Departments of English is associated with H &C publications for proof reading. Students from other institutions carry out project works under the faculty of Microbilogy and Biotechnology.

g) Extension

The College has signed an MoU with St. Mary's C.U.P. School, Chiyyaram for the adoption of 40 children who will be provided support for academic and personality development. The College under the initiative of Social Work Department has signed an MoU with Kolazhy Panchayat for making Kolazhy a Child Friendly Panchayat. The following activities are envisaged in the project. The Department of Biotechnology collaborates with IMA for the organization of Blood Donation Camps every year. The College had a collaboration with Rajagiri School of Social Sciences for the implementation of CASP (Community Aided Sponsorship Project), Department of Economics provides support to the needy and deserving through *Vatsalyam. Santhwana Sparsham* by Department of English promotes organ donation.

h) Publication

Faculty of the College in association with other researchers and experts publishes books and research articles in national and international journals. Students are guided to present and publish papers in seminars and conferences organised by other institutions and agencies.

i) Student Placement

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell in association with various agencies organize programmes for enhancing the skill of students and provide them opportunity to present themselves for placement within and outside the campus. Several students are selected for placement in various organizations, in the recruitment drive organised in the College and in other institutions. The Department of Vocational Programmes



has signed an MOU with two industries Wi3 solution, Thrissur and e-icon solution, Thrissur by which the two industries have promised placements for eligible students in their industries.

j) Twinning programmes

There are no twinning programmes by the College.

k) Introduction of new courses

Two UGC Sponsored innovative B.Voc degree programmes have been introduced in the current academic year and the Departments offering these programmes have collaboration with industries for the benefit of these students. Hence the introduction of B.Voc in Software Development and B.Voc in Multimedia has resulted in the signing of MoUs for collaboration with the two industries Wi3 solutions, Thrissur and e-icon solution, Thrissur.

1) Student exchange

The institution is planning for cultural exchange with other regional, national and international institutions. The institution had arranged a cultural programme, an exhibition on Thrissur and an Interactive session on Kerala History for the faculty and students of Davidson College, USA. The Director and team, Caritas International, Germany had visited the College and our students presented cultural programmes and an interaction was arranged between the guests, faculty and students.

CRITERION IV INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The CMC Management has always been keen on providing good infrastructure facility for effective teaching and learning. It is this policy that has helped the College to have adequate and good infrastructure in spite of the fact that it is situated in the heart of Thrissur city. The Management has moved with the times to meet the infrastructural needs of each generation of students. A new spacious hostel was completed in 2011 to provide good residential facility to the students. 1.76 acres of land was acquired within 1.5 km radius for constructing the sports ground and indoor stadium. UGC funds are available from time to time for expansion and upgradation of infrastructure. But since UGC funds do not always meet all the requirements the management spends a large amount on infrastructural expansion.

The policy of the institution situated in the heart of the Thrissur city with regard to infrastructure has been optimal utilization of the available infrastructure and the institution is a role model in this aspect for other institutions with space constraint. The campus is limited to 3 acres and 10 cents in the main campus and 1 acre and 76 cents of sports land about 1.5 kilometres from the main campus. The institution went through an infrastructural crisis due to the rapid introduction of 4 UG, 5 PG, 2 B.VOC and a research programme in the last five years. But the effective and optimal utilization of the existing infrastructure has resulted in adequate facilities for all the curricular and extracurricular activities of the College. With the shifting of the resident students to the new hostel completed in 2011, the old hostel had become dysfunctional. The introduction of a large number of courses had brought about a shortage of classrooms. As the current building rules did not allow for the demolishment of the old hostel and a construction of a new building, the existing old hostel was renovated at an expense of Rs.2 crores with great resourcefulness to provide 36 classrooms, 3 seminar halls, 6 departments, a sick room and a gym.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution/campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

The area which needs utmost planning and systematic implementation with regard to this College is infrastructure. Within a short span of 5 years, 12 new programmes were introduced. Though the management has never lagged in providing adequate infrastructure facilities in its educational institutions the case of this College was different from other institutions due to the space constraint imposed by its prime location in the heart of Thrissur city. But the Principal backed by the management with great missionary thinking and systematic planning implemented the policy of optimal utilization of existing infrastructure and has succeeded in providing adequate infrastructural facilities. Renovation, restructuring and remodeling have been effectively combined to remove the shortage of infrastructure. The renovation and restructuring of the old hostel has provided 36 new class rooms, 3 seminar halls and a Gym Centre. Implementation of innovative ideas has resulted in 2 roof top examination halls and terrace farming.

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The layout of the building in the campus was such that it was difficult for a student with physical disability to reach the library .To remedy this the ancient solid stairs to the upper block of the College was drilled with great difficulty and a passage was created from the central courtyard to the library, thus providing library access to the differently abled students. Classrooms are shifted to the ground level for the benefit of physically disabled student or when a student suffers an incapacitating injury. Students with physical disabilities can make use of the wheel chair available in the College. Braille material and audio cassettes are available in the College library for the benefit of the visually challenged.

4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

It was in 2011 that the mega project of Rs.3.7 crores, a Women's hostel with UGC assistance of 80 lakhs, was completed. The hostel is spacious, well ventilated, and clean with granite flooring, solar water heaters and biogas plant for waste management.

Hostel Facility

The hostel accommodates staff and students from the College and students from other institutions. Five faculty are residing in the College hostel.

Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga center etc.

Yoga training is provided to the hostel inmates by the sports students.

Computer facility including access to internet in hostel

The hostel has only one computer and internet facility is not available in the hostel.



But they can avail internet facility in the College on all days except Sundays.

Facilities for medical emergencies

First aid facility and doctors on call in case of emergency are available in the hostel. There are about 5 hospitals in 1 km radius of the hostel and dealing with medical emergencies is not a problem.

Library facility in the hostel

Newspapers and magazines are available in the common room and a library for spiritual books is also maintained. Hostel inmates can avail the College library facility from 8.00 am to 5.00 pm on all days except Sundays.

Internet and Wi-Fi facility

Hostel students can make use of the Browsing Centres of the College an all days except Sundays and public holidays.

Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments

The hostel has a common room with audio visual equipments like TV and VCD player.

Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy

Residential faculty is available for the staff in the College Hostel. Five faculty are making use of this facility. In addition a separate staff quarters is there which can accommodate 11 sister staff of the College. There is constant supply of safe drinking water, hot water facility from solar water heaters, laundry service once a week and telephone facility in the hostel.

Security

Round the clock security is provided by a watchman and 24 CCTV cameras are used for the surveillance of the hostel and surroundings.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

An annual medical check-up is mandatory for all students. A sick room with first aid facility and a Doctor on call in emergency is available in the campus. There are at least 5 hospitals within a 1 km radius of the campus for medical emergencies.

Students can avail the services of qualified counselor for psychiatric problems. Sr. Grace Thomas provides counselling for the students and general public on all days and Dr. C.R. Sivadasan provides counseling to sports students. In addition to these facilities the departments provide awareness on health and hygiene to the students. Free Medical Camps, Blood Donation Camps and Disease Detection Camps are organized by the alumnae and the departments.

The library has two stories. The front door of the library opens to the property counter which is spacious with racks, a current awareness board and e-gate register. There are two doors in the property counter which open to the central part of the library. One door is used to enter and the other is used to exit. Next to these doors is the circulation counter. The staff in the counter can easily watch the incoming and outgoing users. The counter is set up in such a way that even if there is only one staff, she can easily watch the entire library including upstairs as its central part is without roof. At the end of the main hall two rooms are arranged, one is for the librarian and the other is for book accession procedures (work area for accessioning and cataloguing). In both the floors there are specific areas for shelves and for reading arrangements. In the ground floor right end and left end is used for shelves and tables and chairs are arranged in the center. It is a parallel arrangement. All the science subject, computer science, history and economics books are arranged in the ground floor. In the ground floor itself, left to the circulation counter, reference shelves are kept, so that the staff can easily manage to give away the requested books to the users. A small but separate area is set apart for the shelves where CD ROMs are kept. There are 14 tables, each having six chairs out of which two tables and twelve chairs are used as newspaper reading area. Newspapers are tagged and kept on separate boards on the tables. One table with six chairs is kept separately for the faculty to do their reading and reference work. Adjacent to that table new arrivals are displayed and a bulletin board is also fixed. There are 10 pillars in the central hall, and the journals are kept in shelves which are placed on both sides of the pillars. The space is utilized fully without compromising the beauty and convenience. The shelves with braille materials, thesis and dissertations are also kept in the same manner. At the end of the Central Hall is the section for five computers with OPAC and internet facility.

A staircase is provided from the main hall to the first floor. The first floor is built like a balcony having four sides and central part without roof. Two sides are fully utilized for arranging shelves. Malayalam, English, Sanskrit literature and language books, religions, ethics and Malayalam books on various science and arts subjects are arranged here. Of the other two sides, one side is arranged for reading and the other for staff reading area and Career Guidance Cell. There is also a computer for OPAC



access in the area. A small portion is set apart for reprography. It has got access from both inside the library and outside the library. At the back end of the first floor, cabins are provided to keep the bounded back volume of the journals and old newspapers.

4.2.3 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years.

To ensure the purchase and use of current titles, the librarian gets assistance from the Departments. They provide the latest and most urgent titles and the librarian makes it available in the library. The latest catalogues of various publishers also help us for the same.

All the Systems for Office use are being networked into a Single Domain. Computers in the Departments are also integrated into the same domain with a different grouping. A 24 port HP switch is installed adjacent to the Office to give LAN connectivity to the office. The Departments are being bifurcated into three sections according to spatial distances. The HP Switch, installed adjacent to Office also support



LAN connections to some of the Department Computers in the main building. A Separate switch with 8 ports is installed in the Botany Lab so that the Departments in that building is connected to LAN. Another 24 port HP switch is installed in the Library Building. This switch provides LAN support to all the machines in the Library and three Departments.

The three computer labs in the main building viz. PG LAB, BCA LAB and Common LAB are connected to the general networking using 6 HP 24 Port Switches in Two racks each in PG Lab and Common Lab. The Multi-purpose Computer centre in St. Joseph Block uses 3 HP 24 Port Switches in a single rack for its networking requirement.

Most of the machines are Internet Enabled via a Linux SQUID Proxy which filters, controls and monitors Internet usage.

All Computers have the Asianet broadband connection with 12 Mbps.46 computers with internet facility are provided in the internet labs on a full time basis so that the staff / students can browse in their free times for educational purpose. Excess computers are provided with internet facility in times of need. Each department is given a computer with internet facility and a printer. Those departments having PG or more than 8 faculty are given an extra system. The students can access the internet also from the library. Each faculty member of the College is provided with an email address under the College domain name with a secure password. Restricted Wi-Fi is also enabled in the campus.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The plan of the institution is to provide adequate internet facility for students and faculty. Plans are underway to enable centralized Wi-Fi in the campus. More facilities will be made available to the students in the library to download and print e-journals and other related documents. Upgradation of IT infrastructure by introducing more smart classrooms and audio visual facilities especially in PG classes is also being taken care of.



A technical assistant has been appointed for the effective use of IT infrastructure in the College. Whenever necessary he attends to any work in connection with failure of systems and repair work. The E-campus Monitoring Committee consisting of teaching staff and technical expert takes care of the upgradation and deployment of IT facilities with the consent of the management. The College has embarked on the project of complete computerization of the administrative and academic activities of the College through DDFS. Agreement for Digital Documentation Filing System (DDFS) has been signed and three administrative staff have been given training in the efficient use of DDFS.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the College?



In addition to the permanent employees, additional staff members are appointed on monthly wage basis for the maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities and equipment of the College. AMCs are taken for the maintenance of costly equipments. Maintenance is never delayed and hence the equipments are in good form and money is not wasted in unnecessary maintenance.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

Calibration is usually done annually. It is also undertaken as and when required.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

Steps taken for upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment

- A 250KVA Indoor Type High Tension Cast Resin Transformers is established to resolve the voltage fluctuations.
- There are Three UPS rooms with 20 UPS, 6 inverters to support the computer systems in case of power failure.
- Maintenance is done periodically to facilitate uninterrupted functioning of computer systems/electronic appliances.
- Four Generators are also established inside the campus.
- Computers are maintained by an in-house technician. Each laboratory has an assistant who ensures that the computers are used properly and sensitive information and equipment is handled with care.
- 33 Fire extinguishers are kept at major places.

Steps taken to ensure constant supply of water

- Pure drinking water is provided to the students and faculty throughout the College, hostel and staff quarters with the help of 2 wells with powerful motors.
- Three water purifiers and four water coolers with hot, normal and cold water are available in the campus.
- Municipal water connection is also available in the campus.
- Rain water harvesting has been implemented.

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

Courses offered, rules of admission, fee structure, dress code and other general instruction are also notified in the prospectus. The language in the information brochure is simple and comprehensible to the students. The College Website gives a detailed account of the College, its activities, facilities, rules and regulations, support services, extension activities, faculty details and so on. Alumnae can register through the College website.

The Vision and Mission of the College aims at moulding coming generations to serve as responsible citizens of the Nation, with deep rooted commitment to the society. Admission to various courses are conducted providing equal opportunities to all sections of society as per the norms of the Government. No capitation fees or donation is charged for admission and staff recruitment. There is utmost transparency in the activities of the institution. The College adheres to the rules and regulations of the government and ensures participatory management. The institution functions in accordance to the details prescribed in the College Calendar.

In addition to the financial aids from the Central, State governments and other national agencies, the College has instituted merit scholarships, prizes, awards for academic and other co-curricular excellence. Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

• Seat Reservation for admission and fee concession and grants are provided to SC, ST, OBC and OEC students as per the norms of Government of Kerala and University of Calicut.



- Fee concessions and other freeships in the form of free books, uniforms, dress materials other stationery is provided by management and staff

- Personal, academic and career counselling is provided to empower the students and to bring these students to the mainstream.
- Entry into service programme, NET coaching and Remedial Coaching provided with assistance from UGC.

Students with physical disabilities:

- Class rooms and Examination rooms are rearranged for the physically challenged
- Braille materials are provided to the blind
- Counselling facilities are provided
- Printed notes and special study support provided
- Extra time is allotted for Internal Exams and University examinations
- Support and Motivation by peers
- Financial assistance by government
- Infrastructure redesigned to meet the requirements of physically challenged

Overseas students:

There are no overseas students in the campus at present. For students outside the state, hostel accommodation is provided. The staff- student interaction makes them feel at home.

Students to participate in various competitions/National and International:

Encouragement is given to the students to participate in competitions and programmes inside and outside the campus. Various activities are conducted by the departments, clubs and forums in the campus to equip students to participate in competitions. Duty attendance is given to the students for participating in different programmes. The names of prize winners of various competitions are announced through public address system which gives a sense of pride to the winners and a motivation to other students. Faculty and parents accompany students for various competitions. Financial support in the form of registration fees, travel charges etc are provided to deserving students.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.



Annual medical checkup by registered medical practitioners are arranged for students and students with serious illnesses are referred to specialists. First aid facility is made available to students. Sick or injured are taken to nearby hospitals for immediate medical help. Sick room of the College enables the students to take rest if sick. The College organizes programmes to promote awareness on health related issues among students. Biochemistry Department hosts 'Ask to Doctor' programme where students can clarify their health queries. Interactive sessions were also arranged with nursing students. Blood group detection camps, Blood donation programmes, Blood tests and Medical camps are organised by the Biotechnology and Biochemistry Departments, Alumnae and NSS units. Talks, Exhibitions and other variety programmes are organised to promote good health practices. Yoga classes are provided to students for healthy body and mind. A Health Hub functions in the College to ensure healthy body and good physique for the students and staff.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

The College with the assistance from UGC have organized Entry into service programmes, NET coaching for SC,ST, OBC and other minorities during 2010-11 2011-12and 2012-13. The Career Guidance Cell and different Departments have conducted coaching classes and orientation programmes for PSC tests, NET and JRF exams, HACCP training etc. PSC coaching is given to all the III Semester UG students of the campus by Career Guidance and Placement Cell. Group Discussions, Classes on Interview techniques, personality development and other orientation programmes are organised to make students confident to face interviews.

Skill development (Spoken English, computer literacy, etc.)

The College conducts various Skill Enhancement Courses and Certificate Courses for all round development of students. The Skill Development Cell evaluates the skill enhancement programmes and provides necessary guidance and suggestions. Add On in Communicative English is provided to first year students. Apart from the Add On courses, the departments and clubs offer various short term Skill Enhancement and Certificate courses. Add on courses and Skill Enhancement Courses are conducted for I and II Semester and Certificate courses for IV Semester Undergraduate students from 2.20 pm to 3.15pm on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Various orientation programmes, career guidance sessions, industrial visits and field trips contribute to the skill formation. Students are trained in ICT aided learning through preparation of power point slides and use of e-resources .The Entrepreneurial Development Club (earlier Creative club) in collaboration with Department of Economics conducts exhibition cum sale of hand works by students.

Support for "slow learners"

The College has introduced Scholar Support Programme (SSP) an initiative of Kerala State higher Education for the uplift of the slow learners. Slow learners are identified



by their class performances and by their test paper marks. Other measures for uplift of slow learners are

- Remedial coaching is provided by all Departments.
- Teaching through peers
- Tutorial and Mentoring
- Counselling
- Orientation programmes

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/business house etc.

Students are encouraged to participate and present papers in seminars and workshops conducted by different institutions. Faculty provides support and guidance to students to prepare papers for presentation. Students visit different libraries for their project and dissertation work. Project works are carried out by many students in association with business houses and industrial units. Students are taken for field trips, laboratory visits, institution visit and industrial visit to provide them with, a practical and real experience. MSc Psychology students undergo internship in hospitals. The students are taken for programmes in All India Radio, participate in film festivals, book exhibitions, career guidance programmes and programmes organised by Government and other agencies.

Publication of Student Magazines

The College publishes its College Magazine- 'Marian Voice' every year. Apart from the staff editor and editorial board, the magazine has a student editor who compiles the magazine with the support of the staff. The College Magazine contains the programmes, activities and events of the College during academic year. Students contribute articles, memoirs, travelogues and other literary works—to the magazine. The magazine has articles in English, Malayalam, Hindi and Sanskrit. The cover page, title and theme of each magazine is designed in connection with the observation of the UN International year.

Hindi Manuscript magazine competition is conducted by Department of Hindi and Department of English organize a Manuscript Magazine Competition in which various departments participate. Women Cell has brought out a manuscript magazine *Nirbhaya* which contains articles on women by students.



5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

Entrepreneurial skills, among the students are developed through various Add On, Certificate and Skill Enhancement Courses. The Add On Courses, Skill Enhancement Courses and Certificate Courses are aimed to give vocational training and self-reliance to students. The Entrepreneurial Development Club organizes demonstration classes on ornament making, glass painting, flower making, paper bag making etc. Exhibition cum sale of handworks-"Our Own" is also organized annually. The Club has initiated sale of ornaments and other items made by students on every 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of the month as part of 'Earn While You Learn'. 'Meet the entrepreneur' programme is organized to create awareness on possibilities of starting an enterprise. The Department of Chemistry organizes demonstration classes on soap making and paper bag making. The Zoology Department does fish culture and sale of aquariums. In 2013-14, Dept. of Computer Science and Applications conducted a State Level Seminar on Startup Village and Entrepreneurship in Kerala to promote women entrepreneurship and providing awareness for starting incubatee companies in association with Start up Village, Kochi. Seven students of MSc Computer Science have done their projects in Startup Village, Kochi. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell also conduct personality development and motivation sessions to instill confidence in students to start enterprises. "Marian Monsoon Fest 2014" for student welfare fund showcased the entrepreneurial skills of the students. Stalls of Homemade food items, Ornaments, Handicrafts, Glass Painting ,Paper Bags, Medicinal and other plants, Aquariums, Accessories and Aquarium fishes, Organic vegetables, Mushrooms were the highlights of the fest. Variety games, Mehandhi Designing, Career Aptitude Tests, Colour Psychology Tests by students and staff are also part of the Fest

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co- curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

College gives ample encouragement to students by providing platform to cultivate and exhibit their inherent talents. Various programmes and competitions are organized with the aim of bringing students to the forefront. Apart from subject associations, NCC and NSS, different clubs and forums organize various programmes and competitions for the students. Special training and practice sessions are arranged for students in sports and other cultural events by recognized trainers. Additional Academic Support, Flexibility in examination:

Special academic help is provided by the faculty to students participating in various competitions. Attendance is given for students to attend competitions at different places. Special classes and remedial coaching are provided. Coaching by peers is encouraged to minimize the effect of losing classes. Help is given to these students to complete and submit the dissertation and projects on time. Internal assessment exams are scheduled by considering the requirements of sport students. In case of absence on account of competitions or training/practice sessions, re exams are conducted. Relaxation is given for presentation of seminars and submission of assignments. Special permission is given for late entry and early exit from classes for practice on the recommendation of Physical Education faculty. Special request is forwarded to the University for conducting Special re-exams for students who have missed exams on account of All India Inter University and Intercollegiate Tournaments.

Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials:

Special nutritious diet is assured to the students participating in various sports events. Free Uniform and sports kit is provided to the students by the College.



Any other

Free Hostel accommodation and food is provided to all students participating in sports. Special training and practice sessions are made available to students participating in sports and D zone and inter zone competitions. Cash prizes are awarded to sports students in recognition of their performances. Facilities for medical treatment are arranged for sports students whenever necessary.

Coaching for NET / JRF is provided twice a year to students and others by Mathematics Department. Department of Economics has conducted Two-day NET orientation for their students and Alumnae. Microbiology Department has conducted HACCP training programme for their students. To improve the skills and competitive ability of the SC, ST, OBC and other minorities Entry into service programme, NET coaching—in Mathematics and History were provided to the students and others. Faculty of the PG—departments motivate students to prepare for different competitive exams and undertake research.

5.1.8 What type of counselling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

Academic and personal counseling is provided through tutorial and mentoring. Each tutor is assigned 20 students who guides and mentors the students. The College has the internalized practice of observing an hour on every Monday as tutorial hour incorporating the hour to the regular timetable. Slow learners are supported with



remedial courses and economically weak students are supported by freeships. Assistance of trained counselors inside or outside the College are provided for specialized psychological counselling. The College has two trained counselors for student counseling and seventeen members of our faculty have undergone counseling course. Counselling facilities for family members, house visits by faculty and hostel accommodation for students with family issues renders confidence in the students. As part of Marian Monsoon Fest the Department of Psychology has conducted a Colour Psychology Test to identify the personality traits of individuals. Career Counselling is made available to all students by Career Guidance Cell and Psychology Departments on all working days from 2.30pm to 4pm

The institution has a well-structured Career Guidance and Placement Cell. The Cell takes initiative in organizing programmes for capability enhancement of the student community. Talks and seminars on Career opportunities and personality development classes are the highlights of the Cell. The details of the job opportunities are announced through the public address system and details are put up on the notice board. The opportunities available to the students are also highlighted on the Department notice board. As the College is a women's only College campus placement opportunities are less. Students are motivated and guided to attend recruitment programmes in different institutions. The faculty in charge renders full support and necessary guidance to the students to participate in the recruitment process. The NSS units of the College in collaboration with Youth Welfare Board and District NSS has organized a one day Civil Service Orientation Seminar on 10-6-2014. 5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

The institution has a formal student Grievance Redressal Cell. The Grievance Redressal Cell consists of Principal, Vice principal, members of the faculty and a student representative. Generally there are three meetings in an academic year. Students can hand over their complaints in written form to the Tutor, Head of the Department or deposit it in the opinion box. The grievances are redressed in the meetings and directives issued to the concerned. The parties involved are called if needed. In case of grievances which require immediate action special meetings are convened. Disciplinary Action Committee looks into the disciplinary issues of the



institution. The Committee meets quarterly and evaluates the discipline of the institution. The matters relating to bus concession and problems with bus employees are informed to the police. Complaints regarding non declaration of results of exams, non-receipt of mark lists etc are informed to the University with urgency. The main grievances redressed in last four years are

- Matters relating to non-declaration of University exam results
- The request for confidential grade card for students
- Matters relating to non-receipt of consolidated mark sheet
- Provision for reexamination of sports students
- Re-examination for students whose results are not available
- Problems regarding bus concession
- Problems with reference to bus employees
- Allotment of classrooms
- Improvement in canteen food
- Performance of the teachers

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The College – the first Women's College in the District, has always stood for the empowerment and progress of women. It functions in line with its vision and mission of grooming young women and for their holistic development. The Women's Cell, Elder St Marians, NSS and the Departments organize talks, debates, orientation programmes to equip and empower women. The faculty guides and provides awareness to students to report any issue of sexual harassment inside and outside the College with confidence. The problems faced by students during transit is given due consideration and matter is reported to police and follow up measures are done. The Anti-Ragging Cell functions in the College to prevent annoyance to fellow students. Psycho Social Counseling is provided to students to sort out family issues. The 3 day annual life guidance course gives directions for a happy and healthy life for girl students in the society.

Anti-ragging Cell functions in the College as per UGC and University norms. The Cell consists of Principal, Vice Principal, faculty representatives and a student representative. The details of the Cell are displayed on the College Notice Board. The Cell directs class tutors to conduct orientation classes to the students on the serious offence of ragging. Orientation on Anti ragging measures is given to I Semester UG and PG students. The freshers are directed to report any instance of ragging to the class tutors or to Anti Ragging Cell. Three meetings are conducted in a year- in June, September and March. As per the directive from UGC, parents and students are asked to file anti ragging affidavit each year. No case of ragging has reported in the last four years.

Alumnae and employer feedback is also collected with due importance. The collected data is analysed in an unbiased way and corrections and changes are made from time to time. The introduction of new Add On, Certificate, Skill Enhancement Courses, new UG and PG programmes, more number of interdisciplinary competitions, career guidance programmes, smart boards, new classrooms etc were suggested through the feedbacks.

5.3.4 How does the College involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, College magazine, and other material? List the publications/materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

Students are active participants in designing the logos and brochures of seminars, arts festival and Monsoon fest. Wall magazines on different themes are prepared by students under the auspices of Malayalam and Economics Departments. The College publishes its College Magazine- "Marian Voice" every year. Students contribute



articles, memoires, travelogues and other literary works to the magazine. The magazine has articles in English, Malayalam, Hindi and Sanskrit. Students are motivated to publish articles and creative works. Opportunity is provided to students to display their works on noticeboard. Departments encourage students to publish wall magazines and manuscript magazines. Six of our students participated in the newspaper designing competition organized by City Journal and won the second place. Department of Economics has brought out "Xplore" a compilation of the abstracts of projects of UG students.

5.3.5 Does the College have a Student Councilor or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

The Student Union is constituted as per the rules and regulations of the University of Calicut. The Student Council of the College consists of - Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, General Secretary, Joint Secretary, Fine Arts Secretary, Magazine Editor, Two University Union Councillors, and General Captain of Sports. The election to student executive council is by parliamentary mode in tune with Lyngdoh Committee report. Two representatives are elected from each class to form the electoral council, and they in turn, elect from among themselves the Office Bearers. The election committee monitors the election. The sports captain will be nominated by the Principal, Head of the Department of Physical Education and Staff Advisor of Students Council.

The election is carried out in a free manner as the campus is politics free. The activities of the College Union for the academic year begin with a formal inauguration of the College Union and the arts club inauguration. The student advisors monitor their activities. They organize Fine Arts festival of the College, celebrate festivals, observe days of national importance and supports the staff in organising major academic and cultural activities in the campus. They lead the students to participate in D zone and Inter zone competitions. The Student Editor plays a prime role in bringing out the College magazine. The University Union Councillors represent the College in Calicut University. The fund for the activities of the Students Union is collected from students at the time of admission according to University norms. The deficit is supplemented by fund raised by students through various programmes under the leadership of the Student Council. The Principal is the Ex officio Patron of College Union. The expenditure of the Council is monitored by the Principal, Staff and Student Advisors. The Grievances of the students are informed to the management through Students Union.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

The Institution has a healthy tradition of involving students in many of its academic and administrative activities. Student membership is mandatory for organizing all subject seminars and association activities. They help the faculty in preparing the programme, making announcements, leading registration and hospitality management. Every class has a representative and assistant representative for



performing the activities relating to the class. Apart from them, every class has a club, forum, fine arts, association, social service, NSS, CSS, and catholic representatives which allows the student support systems function effectively. A student from every Department is a member of Research Forum, IQAC and Career Guidance Cell. College Chairperson represents the student community in IQAC core committee, Anti Ragging and Grievance Redressal Cell. College Union members supported by the class representatives actively involved in exhibition, quiz, debates and invited talks, observance of important days, Onam and Christmas celebrations and College Day activities. College union members play an important role in ensuring the discipline of the institution.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumnae and former faculty of the Institution.

The Alumnae join hands with the staff and students in organizing different programmes, visit to poor homes, conducting national seminars, camps, talks, classes and in carrying out Institutional Social responsibility. Alumnae is represented in IQAC. Alumnae of the Department of Economics participates in the Alumnae Lecture Series and contribute well to their extension activity *Vatsalyam*. Alumnae visits the College and Departments occasionally and extends all possible support to the fresh graduates for their higher education programmes. The staff keep in touch with the alumnae through social networks. The College has Book Bank contributed by Elder Marians. The College is proud to have twenty two of its alumnae as faculty members. The association of retired faculty of the institution, SMART (St. Mary's Association of Retired Teachers) also participates in the activities of the College. They are invited for the College day, seminars, and extension talks and for special lectures. SMART gathers in the College for celebrating festivals and retirement functions and they offer their guidance and support to the faculty whenever required. The retired teachers and alumnae has contributed to the endowments for the students.



CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

The CMC Education Policy lays down that education is not just a profession but a sacred call, a great apostolate through which we participate in the teaching mission of the Church. "Our aim is the pursuit of intellectual and professional excellence for total formation of the human person as much for her own enrichment as for the service of the Society and the Nation in the spirit of Christ" (CMC Constitution, art.97).

St. Mary's College was established in 1946 as a missionary institution with the mission of ensuring holistic development of young women through higher education. The institution's objective was to mould them as responsible citizens with deep rooted commitment to the society and the nation. To achieve this vision, the CMC management has formulated a mission of grooming women as agents of love, justice and peace through love of God, pursuit of knowledge, moral integrity and social responsibility. The Mission statement also includes inculcating in young Marians a deep rooted commitment to society so that they will work for a society which promotes faith, religious harmony and national integration. The institution aims to move with the times and introduce innovative methods of teaching-learning to make the students competent to face the challenges of globalization.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The CMC Nirmala Province which has 74 educational institutions including 70 schools, 2 colleges, a parallel college and a Teacher Training institution has a well-structured educational system. As the CMC Management has been active in the field of Higher Education since 1946, it designs and plans with a long term vision of enhancing the quality of the educational institutions under the congregation.

Governing Body

The Governing Body with the Corporate Manager at the apex is the decision making body of the educational policies of the Congregation. The Governing Body includes in addition to the Corporate Manager, the Local Managers and Principals of St. Mary's College, Thrissur and Vimala College, Thrissur which come under her jurisdiction, elected members from the teaching and non-teaching staff and a nominated member who is the secretary cum treasurer. The Governing Body meets twice a year to review, plan and implement its policies for the development of the two Colleges. The decisions taken by the Governing Body is executed by the Principals after it is ratified by the Local Management Committee, Education Committee and College Council.



Education Committee

It comprises of the Principal, Bursar, Local Manager, Superintendent, senior teaching staff and Hostel Warden. The Committee meets once a month to evolve strategies to sustain and enhance the quality of the institution in all the ways possible. At the beginning of every academic year the Committee prepares an action plan for the year and submits it before the Governing Body.

The major decisions taken and implemented by Education Committee are following:

- Hike in the salary of Guest, Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff
- Retreat for Catholic staff and students
- Fixation of fees for Self-Financing Courses
- Introduction of new courses
- Sanctioning of educational loan to wards of non-teaching staff
- Renovation of Old Hostel to provide class rooms
- PG departments are responsible for PG admission
- Setting up of a Tissue Culture Lab
- Renovation of Microbiology and Biotechnology laboratories
- Purchase of 10 cents of land for sports land
- Appointment of HR personal to IQAC

Local Management Committee

Internal coordination is brought forth through the Local Management Committee which comprises of the Local Manager, Principal, Vice Principal, Superintendent, Warden, Bursar and teaching and non-teaching staff of the College, who are members of the CMC Educational Society. The major decisions taken and implemented by the Local Management Committee are the following:

- Purchase of land for sports
- Sale of land at Nadathara due to administrative difficulties
- A Marian Trust to be constituted
- St. Mary's Outreach Sponsorship Programme to be introduced
- Renovation of Old Hostel

Principal

The Principal is the Executive Head of the institution and takes appropriate decisions pertaining to governance of the College in consultation with the Corporate Manager. In the past 4 years the College was efficiently governed by two able administrators Sr. Dr. Kochurani O. G. and Sr. Dr. Jacintha C.C. The Former Principal, Sr. Dr. Kochurani O. G, was an excellent administrator and a great visionary who was instrumental in raising the quality of the institution in a very short period of time. Some of her important achievements are the following;-

- New Hostel Block
- Recruitment of 26 faculty



- Restructuring of UG in Polymer Chemistry to UG in Chemistry
- Introduction of 2 UG and 2 PG Programmes
- Promotion of research
- INFLIBNET facility
- Introduction of Mathematics Research Centre
- Renovation of infrastructure to provide 2 Examination Halls, 2 Seminar Halls, a Research Centre and a Multipurpose Computer Centre

The Current Principal, Sr. Dr Jacintha C.C. is also a noted educationist who was the Education Councillor of CMC Nirmala Province for 6 years from 2006 to 2012. Notable achievements of the current Principal are the following

- Introduction of 2 UG, 2 PG and 2 B.Voc Programmes
- Renovation of the Old Hostel to provide 36 Classrooms and 3 Seminar Halls
- Upgradation of 14 Classrooms into Smart Classes
- Implementation of rain water harvesting
- Marian Monsoon Fest organised to constitute Student's Welfare Fund

College Council

The College Council is the most important academic and administrative body of the institution for internal co-ordination. Its constitution and functioning is as per University statutes. It consists of the Principal, Vice-Principal, and Heads of all Departments, Librarian and Superintendent. Two members from among the heads are chosen as the Secretary and the Joint Secretary of the Council. The Council monitors , reviews and implements academic matters like introduction of new courses , teaching-learning methods examinations, time table, student discipline and administrative matters like student admission ,infrastructural expansion etc .

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission.

The objectives of CMC education includes faith formation, integral personality formation, value based education, women empowerment, renewal of families through children, social commitment, culture of peace and concern for the poor and marginalized. To realize these objectives the CMC devises an action plan which includes holistic development of students through training, the formation of, organizing programmes which help women empowerment, reaching out to families through students, encouraging religious harmony and patriotism, conveying the message of brotherhood and giving special concern for the poor by reserving a particular percentage of seats in schools/colleges for the poor and supporting the poor children by providing fee concession, learning tools, uniforms etc.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan



The Principal in consultation with the Vice-Principal and College Council drafts a work distribution for the entire academic year by allotting the responsibility of the various Committees, Forums and Cells to respective staff members. Before the commencement of the academic year the Time Table Committee prepares a general time table for the whole College. The Departments also prepare their individual timetables in accordance to the general timetable. Each faculty is allotted the required teaching hours and Modules are assigned to each faculty according to her /his expertise and experience. At the beginning of every academic year, the Departments draft an action plan for the year and the collective work is distributed among the faculty. The feedback on the different criteria from the different stakeholders is analyzed and the suggestions for improvement are submitted before the Governing Body for implementation.

Interaction with stakeholders

The College has cultivated a very friendly, supportive and mutually beneficial relationship with the stakeholders from its inception in 1946. Many well-wishers and patrons have emerged from the stakeholders to provide financial, academic and organizational support to the institution. The interaction with the stakeholders takes place in a formal and informal way. Formal feedback is taken from the major stakeholders-parents, alumnae, students and staffs on the various aspects like administration, academic transaction, infrastructure facilities and so on. The feedback is then analyzed and proper remedial measures are undertaken to correct the defects in the system. The Manager interacts with the faculty every year monitoring and encouraging them to do their work sincerely.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

Future Planning is done at various levels. The Governing Body meets twice a year to plan and review long term development strategies. The Education Committee prepares an action plan at the beginning of every academic year and submits it to the Corporate Manager. This is followed by a monthly meeting to discuss the implementation of the plans. The Local Management Committee and the College Council review the plans of the Education Committee and implement the plans. PTA Executive Committee meets every first Saturday and Alumnae Executive Committee meets once in two months to supplement the developmental strategies of the institution.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence

Christian institutions are renowned for their culture of excellence and parents who want their children to excel seek admission for their wards in these institutions. Visionary planning keeping in sight future development, systematic administration, proper scheduling of work, close attention to minute details and the whole hearted and



zealous involvement of the Management has contributed to the evolution of a culture of excellence in these institutions.

St. Mary's College, Thrissur being the first higher education institution of the CMC management has imbibed all these characteristics and this has led to the crystallization of a culture of excellence in the College. It is an acknowledged fact in the local society, and among other higher education institutions that the activities and programmes of the College will be of a high standard. The numerous healthy practices of the institution internalized and institutionalized over a long period of time have contributed to the formation of this culture.

Champion organizational change

The Education policy of the CMC Congregation has always been in tune with the times and has championed changes to suit the needs of the society. An educational institution cannot survive unless it is ready to adapt to the changing scenario.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- Long term planning of the Governing body.
- Participatory management and delegation of authority.
- Future plans advocated by the Education Committee.
- Discussion and review of future plans in the Local Management Committee and the College Council.
- Action plan prepared by Departments at the beginning of every academic year and submitted to the Principal.
- Review of the previous year's action plan to verify implementation.
- Periodic meetings of various committees to ensure proper coordination and systematic implementation.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The well-organized hierarchical structure of the CMC Management ensures effective leadership at different levels of governance. The Department is the lower most administrative unit. The head of the Department coordinates the activities of the department and distributes the work to the faculty of the Department. The Head of the department is a member of the College Council which is headed by the Principal and is actively involved in the decision making process of the institution. One senior member from each department is represented in the IQAC and the College developmental plans are implemented by the IQAC under the leadership of the IQAC Coordinator and Joint Coordinator.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?



The Manager and the Education Committee play an active role in selecting meritorious candidates with communicative skills and leadership potential to the two colleges under the management. After their induction to the institution they are groomed and trained to acquire leadership qualities. They are put in charge of various committees, clubs and forums and acquire through experience the qualities needed to guide and motivate the students. In addition to this leadership trainings are organized every year to equip the faculty with the necessary leadership skills. The faculties are also encouraged to attend leadership training programme in other institutions.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Though the departments do not have absolute autonomy they are given the freedom to formulate and implement the action plan for each academic year. Major financial and infrastructure requirements are provided by the Principal and the management. Each department has an association and the respective association activities are organized from the association fund collected from the students.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The management has from the very beginning promoted participatory management in the administrative and academic activities of the college. Though the management is the decision making body, all the stakeholders of the institution participate in the governance of the institution. Student representation is ensured in major committees like IQAC, Grievance Redressal cell, Anti Ragging cell and Career Guidance cell. The College Union acts as the intermediary between the College Council and the students. The IQAC acts as a meeting point for all the stakeholders as it consists of representatives of the management, teaching and ministerial staff, PTA, Alumnae and College Union.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

As the college is managed by Christian nuns they are wholly dedicated to the cause of quality and excellence. This insistence on quality begins with the qualified and meritorious faculty and non-teaching staff and is followed strictly in all the aspects like curriculum enrichment, teaching learning process, research and extension, infrastructure expansion, student support and mentoring, department activities and administration and all the varied and institutionalized Healthy Practices of the College. This policy of excellence is clearly stated in the Vision of the College and has been implemented throughout the 68 years of its existence. The Corporate Manager meets



and interacts with the newly appointed staff and conveys the policy of excellence followed by the College. It is the Principal who conveys to the newly inducted students this quality of excellence. Academic and administrative policies and activities are well planned, keeping in mind this penchant for excellence.


6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

No institution can develop without long term planning and periodic additions and changes to the plan. The Governing Body which came into being at the inception of the College prepared the blueprint for the developmental plans of the college. From time to time according to the need of the times additions and revisions are made to this. The NAAC peer team which visited the College in 2010 recommended the preparation of a 10 year future plan for the institution. Accordingly soon after the reaccreditation of the College the Principal directed the departments to prepare a future plan for the next 10 years. These departmental plans were submitted to the Principal. The Principal, College Council and the IQAC together finalized the future plan of the institution for the next 10 years. The perspective plan includes aspects like introduction of new courses, curriculum enrichment, new methods of teaching to be introduced, training for faculty, organization of seminars, workshops and lectures, applying for major and minor projects, establishment of research centres and research facility, infrastructure expansion and upgradation, introduction of student support initiatives, career guidance activities, recreational and sports facilities, seminars and activities for parents and alumnae and eco-friendly initiatives.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The Principal coordinates and control the administrative and academic activities of the College with the support of the Vice Principal. The College Council and the IQAC assist the Principal in internal Coordination. The Departmental activities are coordinated by the Heads and the activities of the various Committees, Forums and Cells are systematically planned and implemented by the coordinators. The Superintendent is in the charge of administrative activities and works in close coordination with the Principal. The Governing Body is the decision making body while the Executive Committee and Local Management are executive bodies which ratify and execute the decisions with the support of the College Council.







6.2.4 Give abroad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

Teaching & Learning

The quality of teaching-learning depends to a great extent on two aspects-improving the quality of the teacher and improving the quality of the teaching aids used. To improve the quality of the faculty, they are encouraged to attend Orientations, Refresher Courses, Training Programmes Conferences, Seminars and Workshops. Faculty Development Programmes are also organised by the institution to improve the quality of the faculty. The College has shifted to a learner centered approach and provides Mentoring, Bridge Course, and Remedial Coaching and encourages Peer Teaching. ICT enabled teaching is promoted through the introduction of Smart Boards, LCDs, Language Lab facility etc. Add Ons and Certificate courses have been introduced to supplement the curriculum.

Research and Development

The College has made great strides in the area of research since its reaccreditation in 2010, because of the encouragement given to the faculty and student to take up and continue research. The Research Committee encourages the faculty to pursue research, publish in National and International Journals and take up projects and present papers. Faculty of the College get opportunity to publish their papers in the science journal "Annals of Basic and Applied Sciences" published by the College. The faculty encourage the students to participate and present papers in seminars, publish in journals and take up research project in industries and research laboratories. Students are also motivated to publish their research finding in journals in collaboration with the faculty who guide them. The Research Forum meets once a month and students get an opportunity to present papers during these sessions.

Community engagement

The College has always given importance to the social responsibility of individuals and institution and has engaged in activities to uplift the underprivileged. College and departments have introduced a number of community extension activities and have also strengthened some of the already existing extension activities. An MoU was signed by the College with St Mary's Convent UP School, Chiyyaram for the adoption of 40 underprivileged school children of the School. The Departments take the students to Old age homes and Orphanages. With the introduction of BSW in this year, the Principal has directed the BSW department to coordinate the community extension activities of the College. The introduction of the BSW programme was aimed at enhancing the community extension activities of the institution.

Human resource management

The structured yet decentralized administration provides for effective human



resource management. Academic and extension activities of the Departments are coordinated by the Heads of the Department with the cooperation of the faculty and the Heads of Department are directly responsible to the Principal. The Principal entrusts the responsibility of the Committees, Forums, Cells and Clubs to the Coordinators who cater to diverse needs of the faculty and students. Under the guidance of the Student Advisors, the College Union works for the benefit of the student community.

Industry interaction

The Skill Enhancement Cell is responsible for the promotion of institution – industry interaction. Seminars/ Workshops in collaboration with industries and industrial experts are organized to give awareness to the students on the scope and need for industry interaction. Students are encouraged to take up research in industries to enhance their placement opportunities. Science students are given the opportunity to visit industries every year.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal briefs the Corporate Manager from time to time and during Governing Body meetings on the administrative and academic aspects of the College. The AQAR and the Annual Report of the College are submitted every year before the Governing Body. The Manager visits the College and interacts with the staff every year. In addition to PTA Executive meetings which is held every month the Departmental PTA Meeting and General Body meeting are held every year. The Alumnae Executive Committee meets once in 2 months and the General Body of the alumnae is held on 26th January every year. The Annual Report of the College is presented before the public on the College Day. Representatives of all the stakeholders meet and interact with each other in the IQAC general body meetings.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The Management has from the inception of the College evolved a friendly and cordial relationship with the staff and the staff have been equally cooperative to the management. Representatives of the staff are present in all the Committees. The major decisions of the institution are taken only after it has been discussed and passed by the College Council .which consists of all the HODs in addition to the Principal and Vice Principal. All the activities of the College are carried out through various committees made up of the staff of the College. Accountability and responsibility are two qualities nurtured by the management in the staff. An evaluation of a major programme /activity is done on completion and the efforts of the staff are acknowledged by the management. The Principal congratulates a committee when an



activity is successfully completed and puts it up on the notice board. The Principal has a personal relationship with the staff and visits their homes and maintains a warm relationship with their family. The institution is like a big family and joys and sorrows are shared with each other.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The first meeting of the Governing Body in 2013-14 was convened at Trinity Covent, Kolazhy on 26/09/13.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Autonomy has been introduced for the first time in Kerala in this academic year and a few colleges have been accorded autonomy. The College has more number of self-financing courses which is a stumbling block in the progress towards autonomy. But the Management is seriously thinking of ways to overcome the hurdle and gradually move towards autonomy. As a first step the College is planning to apply for CPE.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

Grievances are promptly attended to and resolved. There are two ways in which grievances are resolved. A Grievance Redressal Cell functions to address the complaints of both the students and the staff. In addition to this, the Tutorial system is very effective in redressing most of the grievances that the students have. In a similar fashion, the faculty express their grievances to the Staff Club who intimate the Principal and necessary action is taken. The parental grievances are discussed during the general body and executive committee meetings of the PTA. The departmental faculty maintains a close contact with the alumnae and redresses their grievances in an informal way.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

 A Case was filed in the High Court in 2011 to issue the direction to finalize the fixation of staff pattern for the appointment of Teaching Staff (High Court-WP (C) No.16186/2011(W) dated 24th Augusts.)



- A case was filed to allow the management to publish notification inviting application (High Court -WP (C) .No. 16186/2011(W) dated 22nd Sep. 2011.)
- There was much delay in staff fixation and hence Government had denied salary to the newly appointed staff. A case was filed and an order directing the University to arrange staff fixation was issued (High Court –WP (C) .No .16186/2011(W) dated 6th December 2011)

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

A student feedback is obtained every year from outgoing UG and PG students using a structured questionnaire on different aspects like teaching, learning, library, office and infrastructure, laboratories and so on. The data obtained is analysed using Likert scale methodology and scores are divided into low, medium and high. The analysis points out that the students have high level of satisfaction towards different aspects like teaching, learning, courses offered, laboratory facilities, discipline etc. But over the years students have indicated that some aspects like hostel facilities, awareness on career opportunities, opportunities for sports and games need to be enhanced further. Considering the suggestions put forward by students the College has taken the initiative to improve the Hostel, conduct more career guidance and campus recruitment programmes as well as provide more opportunities and training sessions to participate in sports, extracurricular and co -curricular activities within and outside the campus.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The CMC Management has always given prime importance to staff quality and has undertaken several strategies to enhance their professional, administrative and management skills.

The following are the steps taken for the professional development of the staff.

- Organised Seminars / Workshops / Talks for the teaching and non-teaching staff
- Provided computer training to the staff.
- Encouraged the staff to attend Seminars /Workshops.
- Motivated the faculty to do research leading to M.Phil and Ph.D
- Encouraged the faculty to take up research projects
- Provided support and encouragement to the faculty to apply for FDP and other developmental programmes

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the



roles and responsibility they perform?

The academic year begins with an Orientation on the duties and responsibilities of the faculty to motivate them to work sincerely in this "Sacred Vocation" as the CMC Management views teaching. Talks and Seminars are organized by the Management from time to time for the professional as well as personality development of the faculty. Youth is a time of personal problems and faculty have to be equipped with basic psychology to provide counseling to the students. It is with this objective that the faculty were given NLP training at Santhidham Counseling Centre, Thrissur. Non-teaching staff are given computer training as the administrative units are all now computerized.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The performance appraisal of the faculty is based on self-appraisal and the faculty evaluation done by the students every year. After the Re-accreditation of 2010, the faculty have internalized the practice of maintaining a record of all their curricular and extracurricular activities in the Teacher's Dairy. At the end of the academic year, it makes it easy for the faculty to assess their overall performance in the Self-Appraisal forms. In addition to this, the Principal takes an evaluation of the faculty from the students. This is analyzed and the faculty are rated according to their performance. The Principal shares the feedback personally with the faculty and motivates them to perform better in the next academic year. The promotion of the staff is based on the self-appraisal and student evaluation.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stake holders?

The feedback from the various stakeholders is taken every year analyzed by the IQAC and the Principal is given a copy of the index of the analysis. Remedial measures are taken to strengthen the weak areas.

The Governing Body is intimated of the performance index of the College at Governing Body meetings. The Governing Body supports the remedial measures whenever and wherever necessary. One of the issues that students of St. Mary's College wanted to be rectified was the lack of class room. The Principal took up this issue with the Corporate Manager and gained sanction for the renovation of the Old Hostel into an Academic Block to provide 36 Class rooms, 3 Seminar halls and other facilities.

The parents offered the feedback that Communicative English courses, Skill Enhancement Courses and Yoga Training should be provided to the students. Accordingly UGC Add Ons in Communicative English and Yoga and Health Management Science, an Advanced Communicative English Certificate Course and Skill Enhancement Courses were introduced.



A TQM Feedback is taken once in five years to assess the overall performance of the institution. The TQM was assessed by the Management through feedbacks from Students, Parents, Teachers and Administrators. Different questionnaires are used to elicit information from them. The questionnaires were divided into four sections – Academic, Social, Spiritual and Administration. In the TQM feedback taken in 2012-13, Students, Parents, Teachers and Administrators have experienced a very high degree of satisfaction towards Academic, Social, Spiritual and Administrative aspects. The TQM feedback obtained from the stakeholders is very positive and the institution hopes to maintain and enhance it to greater levels.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The excellent reputation of the College, good academic ambience, well maintained clean campus, the encouragement given by the management to the overall personality development of the faculty, good library and laboratory facilities, the long tradition of healthy practices are all factors that attract eminent faculty to the institution and prompt them to remain in the institution.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

As the administration of the institution is systematic and well structured, financial management is also done in an effective and efficient manner. The Bursar is in charge of the financial transactions of the institution. The Bursar is supported by the Superintendent and administrative staff. The institution avails of government grants and UGC grants through proper planning and application submissions on time. The funds are effectively utilized for the purpose for which it is granted and the income and expenditure are properly audited and filed. The College has a large number of self-financing programmes and the financial management of these programmes is also effectively coordinated. UGC grants do not always meet the expenses involved in infrastructure expansion and maintenance. The management contributes the deficit in the budget and caters to the development of the College.



6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Internal audit is carried out every year by private chartered accountants. External auditing is done annually by the DD's office and AG's Office. The last audit was done on 22/04/2014. The major audit objection according to letter No: G2-28934/0 MO of the Kerala Education Director was that the registration fees remitted in the PD Account cannot be taken back from the account.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of funding for the institution are government grants, UGC grants, government salary of staff, fee collected for self-financing courses, scholarships, Management, PTA and Alumnae. Though the Management is efficient enough to avail the maximum financial funding from the Government and the UGC it is not always enough for the developmental activities of the institution. The deficit is provided by the management. There is no reserve fund available with the institution. The Management provides the necessary fund whenever it is needed.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The institution encourages well-wishers, sponsors, PTA and alumnae to contribute to the developmental activities of the institution. Departments, faculty and students are encouraged to take up projects and activities with financial assistance from external funding agencies.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

For sustaining and enhancing the quality of the institution, the IQAC was constituted in 2005. The IQAC comprises of the Principal, Vice Principal, Coordinator, Joint Coordinator, a Department Faculty representative, a Student representative, Management representative, an industrial representative, 2 alumnae representatives and 2 local community representatives. Even before the NAAC accreditation and the IQAC came into being, the College had stood for quality and academic excellence. The constitution of the IQAC has provided an impetus to the



enhancement of quality in not just academic activities but in all the seven criteria for development specified by NAAC. The IQAC has taken complete charge of the quality related activities of the institution and has evolved strategies for the progress of the College. Yearly academic audit of the departments, compilation of the AQAR and SSR have paved the way for quality improvement in academic matters.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The IQAC submits development proposals to the Management through the Principal. The Management always supports the endeavours of IQAC to enhance and assure quality education to all. The following are some of the proposals put forward and implemented by IQAC

- Organized 2 National Seminars –Quality Enhancement in Higher Education through Student Support and Progression(2012), Recent Trends in Higher Education Policies: Scope and Challenges in Governance, sponsored by NAAC(2014) and organised a National Workshop on Digital Age Pedagogy: Perspectives and Prospects(2014)
- Organised programmes on Self Esteem, Personality Development, Teaching Methodology etc for students and faculty
- Provided Orientation to the first semester UG and PG students and their parents every year
- Initiated Sr. Dr. Rani George Endowment Fund for organising a Lecture and National Level Paper Presentation Competition annually
- Organised Gender Sensitisation and Environment Awareness Programmes
- Introduced 14 Smart Boards for ICT enabled teaching
- Arranged research oriented programmes to enhance research culture in students and faculty
- Organised Value Education and Personality Development Programmes for non catholic students
- Initiated Certificate and Skill enhancement Courses
- Initiated of Entry level tests for I Semester UG students

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

The IQAC has 3 external members, Prof. Cyriac John, Prof. Annam John and Ms. Priya Chakola a successful entrepreneur. The first two are representatives of the local community and are very much committed to the society and are ready to provide their help and cooperation to the institution. Prof. John Cyriac is a former Municipal Councilor and President of the Public Library, Thrissur and has agreed to a collaboration between the Public Library and the College by which the Public library will organize "Meet The Author" programmes in the College and in return the students of the college will contribute to the of the Public Library. It was on his suggestion that



the Microbiology Department organized a Cancer Awareness Programme. Prof. Annam John is the Municipal Councilor of Thrissur Corporation .She is also a retired faculty of the College and is a role model for all students who aspire to be educated in the true sense. With her cooperation, the College has launched a cleanliness drive in the ward from where she is the Councilor. Ms. Priya Chakola the representative of the industry, combines in her in equal measures the qualities of maturity, intelligence and confidence required to create a truly empowered woman and is also a good role model for the students.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The College Union and the IQAC student members from each class represent the student community in the IQAC The student representatives are actively involved in the organization of IQAC seminars and other major activities of the IQAC. The Union Chairperson is present during general body meetings and takes the initiative to promote the quality of the curricular and co-curricular activities. The IQAC directly organised 2 workshops to enhance the ICT skills of the faculty in collaboration with the Department of Computer Science. The IQAC has instituted an endowment in honour of the former Principal Sr. Dr. Rani George which will be utilised for the organization of a yearly endowment lecture and a paper presentation competition for PG students. The alumnae have become very active in the last 5 years and have contributed a lot to the welfare of the college. The President and Secretary of the alumnae are members of the IQAC.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

All the stakeholders of the institution faculty, students, administrative staff, parents, alumnae, the local community and management are represented in the IQAC. Major decisions of the IQAC are taken in the general body meetings. Intranet connection is there to connect the IQAC with the Departments, the administrative sectors, and the library. For the smooth conduct of administration a weekly report of the departmental activities is mailed to the IQAC room. The IQAC administrative staff representative coordinates the IQAC work of the non-teaching staff and informs the IQAC Coordinator of their major activities.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated frame work for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

The IQAC acts as the coordinating agency for assuring the quality of the academic and administrative activities of the institution. A yearly visit is made to the Departments, administrative units and library at the beginning of the academic year. The IQAC members audit the academic performance of the Departments and suggest developmental activities. The Departments follow a uniform filing system as directed



by the IQAC. The IQAC organised two National Seminars related to quality in the post re-accreditation period. The NAAC sponsored Seminar on "Recent Trends in Higher Education Policies: Scope and Challenges in Governance" was rated as very effective by the staff of the College and neighboring colleges. NAAC peer team members are invited from time to time to provide awareness on quality sustenance and enhancement measures and this has definitively lead to the introduction of many quality related initiatives.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff or effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The College organizes Workshops and Orientations every year to provide awareness and training to the teaching and non-teaching staff on quality maintenance and enhancement techniques. The institution also encourages the staff to attend quality related Seminars, Workshops and Training sessions conducted by Governmental and Non-Governmental institutions inside and outside the state. The Management meets the expenses of the staff who attend seminars/workshops on quality initiatives. The administrative staff of the College organized UGC sponsored One Day State level Seminar on "Tools and Techniques of E-governance for Ensuring Efficient Administration" on 15th December 2012.

Training in Computer skills and e-governance is organized from time to equip the administrative faculty. Faculties are also given Workshops on ICT enabled teaching-learning. The quality assurance related trainings organized by the institution and the exposure to seminars on quality organized by reputed institutions have motivated the staff to work zealously for excellence.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Auditor other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Internal as well as external audit is carried out in the institution. Internal audit is done by the IQAC and external audit in done by academic expert from outside the college. The suggestions of the experts are analysed and implemented.

6.5.5 How is the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

There has always been a quality mechanism in the College even before the introduction of the IQAC in the College. The IQAC was established immediately after the first accreditation of the College. The constitution of the IQAC is in line with the NAAC directives. In 2009 when the semester system was introduced a College Level Monitoring Committee came into being at the directive of the University. This Committee is in charge of monitoring curriculum transaction in the Choice Based Credit Semester System.



6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The College Council is the body that reviews and reforms the teaching-learning process in the college. Grievances on teaching learning reach the College Council through the Grievance Redressal Cell, Tutors, Heads of Departments and Opinion Boxes. These complaints are analysed and necessary steps are taken to remedy and enhance the quality of teaching-learning process. Promotion of the faculty is based on student feedback and self-appraisal of the faculty.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The Quality sustenance and enhancement policies and the role of IQAC in formulating and implementing the same is communicated to the various stakeholders during the executive committee and general body meetings of the stakeholders. The newly admitted students and their parents are given an orientation on their first day in College regarding the quality related activities of the college. Quality assurance policies and mechanisms and the outcome of these policies are communicated to the stake holders through the Annual Report of the College. AQAR is submitted every year to the NAAC and is uploaded in the College website.

Any other relevant information regarding Governance, Leadership and Management which the college would like to include.

The penchant for quality is communicated verbally and non-verbally to all the stakeholders the moment they become a part of the Marian fraternity. Each and every act is executed with the greatest care possible so as to maintain a high level of excellence. The appointment of the staff is based on merit and when they are appointed they are given an orientation by the Corporate Manager about the expectation of the Management on the high quality work culture expected from them. Students are also given an orientation at their entry into the institution on the culture of excellence maintained since its inception. The Management being a non-profit community is very particular about maintaining a high standard in academic and administrative matters. This insistence on quality is communicated through the college Handbook and Calendar, Prospectus, Website and all other publications and events of the institution.



CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Internal Green Audit is done in the campus under the initiative of Department of Botany. Efforts are made to include various areas such as Biodiversity conservation, greening of campus to reduce the carbon imprints, water conservation and waste management under its purview. Though the campus is in the heart of the city, the institution makes utmost effort to make the campus environment friendly.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy conservation

The College always has uninterrupted power supply as it has its own high tension Cast Resin transformer of 250 KVA and four generators of 125 KVA (full back up – College and Hostel), 82.5 KVA (St Joseph block), 30 KVA (Library block) and 15 KVA (College block). A capacitor of 70 KVAR is installed to prevent voltage fluctuation. To avoid damage to instruments due to voltage fluctuations, stabilizers are used. There are 20 online UPS of varying capacities used in the College campus, 3 KVA – 4 Nos, 5 KVA – 5 Nos, 6 KVA – 1 No, 7.5 KVA – 7 Nos. Various measures adopted by the institution to conserve energy are

- Switching off lights, fan, AC, computers, LCDs when not used.
- Move towards energy saving appliances, air conditioners, refrigerators by replacing old energy consuming models with new energy efficient models.
- Use of CFL Bulbs.
- LCD/LED Computer Monitor.
- Regular upkeep and maintenance of electric appliances switch board, water taps, electric and water lines to prevent leakage and wastage.
- Reducing use of power by using pressure cooker in laboratories instead of autoclave

Use of renewable energy

As a move towards reducing the dependence on conventional non-renewable source of energy, solar water heaters are used in the College hostel and staff quarters. Solar lighting has also been introduced in the College garden. Four biogas plants are maintained in the Hostel and staff quarters to meet the energy requirements for cooking and reduces the dependence on LPG.



Water harvesting

Rain water harvesting system with a built up water tank of 54600 L capacity is installed in the College and hostel for the effective collection of rain water. The collected water is utilized for watering the plants and cleaning. Rain water harvesting with a capacity of 500L is also successfully carried out by Chemistry Department and the harvested water is utilized for laboratory washing purposes. Use of Rain water as distilled water for laboratory experiments—save the energy consumption in making the distilled water.

Check dam construction

To ensure the availability of safe drinking water, in connection with the UN International Water Day Celebration, the Bhoomitrasena Club and Department of Botany has undertaken a cleaning up programme of a common well situated in SC colony at Chembukavu. The well currently meets the water supply requirements in the colony. Our sports students participated in the cleaning drive of famous Vadakechira, a landmark water body in Thrissur City.

Efforts for Carbon neutrality

Every individual needs to strive towards reduction of carbon. With this motto the institution gives due importance to reduction of carbon imprint as they consider it as their responsibility to protect the generations to come. The College has undertaken some initiatives to regulate and reduce the carbon emissions.

- Growing of indoor plants
- Use of LPG in College Canteen and Biogas in College Hostels.
- Garbage is not directly burnt in the campus
- Outside vehicles are not allowed into the College campus
- Car-pooling is encouraged among staff
- Students are motivated to travel by city bus than use individual vehicles
- Driving classes are conducted to equip students with competent driving skills and provide them the right way of driving and to handle vehicles to reduce the carbon imprint
- Going digital to reduce paper use

Plantation

RET garden was established in 2009 by Department of Botany in collaboration with M.S. Swaminathan Resarch Foundation, Wayanad for the conservation and protection of Rare, Endangered and Threatened plant climbers and other plant groups with about 150 different plant species. The Botanical garden contains about 200 plants belonging to different plant groups. Orchid garden contains about 15 species which includes rare and endangered plant varieties. A fern garden also exists in the campus with nearly 30 varieties of ferns. The Department has undertaken the project "Know



Plants, Grow Plants" with an intention to create an awareness of various medicinal plants and the need of their protection and promotion. Under this programme, 25 medicinal plants are distributed to 25 different schools in Thrissur for establishing a herbal garden in the respective institutions. Regular monitoring of the garden are conducted and various competitions relating to the "phytomedicine and conservation aspects of medicinal plants" are organized for the school students. With the assistance from Oushadhi, the Department has set up a well maintained herbal garden consisting of about 500 medicinal plants. Winter and other vegetable seedlings and medicinal plants are distributed among the staff and students of the college. A Butterfly Garden-Shalabha has been set up to conserve butterflies thereby to conserve nature. The inauguration of seed production as part of the project "Green Thrissur" - a joint venture of Calicut University NSS & TDA (Thrissur Development Authority), was held in the College by Hon. Pro-Vice Chancellor Prof. K Raveendranath. In connection with International Year Of Family Farming students grow some vegetables in the College campus. Terrace gardening is carried out by certain departments to overcome the space constraint. Indoor plants are grown which has positive impact of reducing carbon emissions. As part of 'vitheriumyatra' the fifth semester BSc Botany students scattered thousands of seeds to the deep forests on way to Koorg, Ooty and Mysore

Hazardous waste management

The College has introduced "L'Aria Fresca", a cleanliness drive to ensure a clean campus and City and ensure a healthy atmosphere. With regard to waste management, the institution calls for minimising the wastes by reducing the use of plastic bags, cups, plates etc. The lunch and tea for all programmes provided are in reusable utensils. The departments advocate the optimal use of paper by the staff and students by writing on both sides of paper, one side used papers are reused and online corrections of assignments and projects are done. Wastes are segregated at the outset into recyclable waste, non-recyclable waste and biodegradable waste. Biodegradable wastes are put into the Vermi Compost pit or biogas units in the College and hostel campus. Vermi wash and vermi compost, prepared is used in College garden. The non-recyclable plastic and other wastes are burned off in the incinerator. There are two incinerators —one in the College and other in the hostel. However open burning is not done in the campus. The recyclable wastes, plastics and other glass item are sold off to the local traders. Awareness is provided to the students and staff in effective classification and disposal of wastes.

The usage of plastic disposable petriplates are minimised and autoclavable glass petriplates are used in the labs. Efficient management is ensured in handling hazardous wastes from the laboratories. Toxic wastes like Ethidium bromide are disposed only after treating with activated charcoal. Aqueous solutions containing<10 μ g/ml EtBr can be released to the drain while aqueous solutions containing>10 μ g/ml EtBr should be filtered or deactivated using charcoal and then the filtrate can be drained down. Microbial cultures are treated with bleach or 70 percent alcohol and then decontaminated Acidic and basic wastes are neutralized before disposing. The acidic and alkaline waste are first diluted and mixed well. Then



the pH is checked. To maintain pH as 7, lime stone is added. Then the neutral effluent which is discharged is less harmful. Students are trained to handle strong acids and other harmful chemicals to prevent any untoward incidents.

E-waste management

Like any organization, managing e waste is a serious issue. The electronic gadgets are carefully handled to make them last long. The damaged electronic products are sold off to the local traders for recycling. The computers and other items are upgraded to the maximum possible level and exchanged for new ones if not possible. The use of rewritable CDs or DVDs and use of e mails are promoted to regulate the waste. The College has an intranet connection for mail transfer. Used CDs or DVDs are used for decorative purposes.

The College has organized different programmes - talks, seminars, competitions, exhibitions, visits, awareness programmes, survey, distribution and planting of seedlings and so on for creating an awareness on the need and importance of protecting our environment and natural resources. The need for conserving and preserving nature is highlighted through the promotion of use of paper bags, paper files, cloth banners for national seminars and other programmes, growing of indoor plants, use of potted plants instead of artificial flower vases, keeping away from plastic files for submission of assignments, using double side paper, unused one side papers are converted into note pads etc. Students are motivated to attend programmes outside the campus to be a part of the bigger society to spread the message of environment conservation.

Best Practice I

1. Title of the Course

Life Guidance Course

2. Goal

The objective of the Course is to equip the final year students to take up the responsibilities of an adult in the family, society and the nation.



3. Context

On completion of the Programme of study, the students emerge into the wide world outside where they have to take up the responsibilities of work, household and society. This transition from the carefree life of the student to the duty bound life of an adult is strenuous for majority of the students. Being a Women's College, a large section of the outgoing students get married soon after the completion of the Programme. The students need to be made aware of their duty to the society and the nation. As a College established in the pre-independent era with the objective of empowering young women, the institution is very particular about imparting holistic education to the students. The basic unit of a society is the family, and women have a very important role in the prosperity and development of a family. Hence it is very essential to provide final year students, with awareness on the basic facts of marital life and the crucial role of women in the character formation of the children of the family. As the founder of the CMC congregation envisioned "When you educate a man you educate a single person but when you educate a woman you educate a whole society".

4. The Practice

Every year a Three - Day Life Guidance Course is organised for the benefit of the final year students. Eminent psychologists and practising marriage counsellors are invited to speak and interact with the students on marriage, manwoman relationship, marital problems and social and national responsibilities of an adult Indian citizen. Sex education is also an important part of the programme. Students are offered a psychological approach to the study of human personality which helps them in understanding themselves and others. Training is imparted to foster the inter-personal skills which are essential at both the work place and the household. The duties of a citizen to the nation and the society are enumerated to inculcate in them social responsibility. The Life Guidance Course offered by the institution gives the students an opportunity to equip themselves with the basic life skills needed for a successful life in society. This Course has been internalised and institutionalised and has been the Best practice of the College for more than 30 years.

5. Evidence of Success

Formal and Informal feedback obtained from the students and the alumnae point out to the great success of this Course. They have emphatically declared the relevance of this Course in their day to day life, at the work place and in the household. They have admitted that Course has a positive impact in helping them to have good interpersonal relationships. Many a time the alumnae have returned to the *alma mater* to acknowledge with gratitude, the practical use of this course in their marital lives.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Time constraint is one of the major problems that hinders the organisation of this Course. In the midst of final year project, examination and syllabus transaction, it is very difficult to allot three whole days for this programme.



Another hurdle is the unsupportive attitude of the students as they do not realise the importance of this Course at this point of time. It is only after the completion of their programme that they realise the significance of this Course.

7. Notes

Life Guidance Course is a must in every institution as it is of great practical use in the personal life of the students. Divorce and Suicide rate of the nation is increasing day by day. Stress related mental and physical disorders are also on the rise. The Life Guidance Course gives students the necessary interpersonal skills to live a balanced life in society.

Best Practice II

1. The Title of the Practice

Educational Sponsorship Project

2. Goal

The objective of this Project is the holistic development of a specific number of school children through an educational sponsorship promoting partnership of educational institutions. The Project aims at the development of these students into advanced learners with a potential for critical thinking and scientific temper. It also aims at enhancing of their IT and soft skills and empowering them with increased subject knowledge and life skills. Value education in provided to ensure that these students evolve into responsible citizens.

3. The Context

The current social scenario points to a marked increase in juvenile delinquency. A number of factors like nuclear families where both parents work, lack of value education, peer pressure, influence of media etc. have impacted negatively on young minds to produce this increase in crime rate. Realizing the importance of proper guidance and support in overcoming negative influences, the College decided to use its human resources to mould children of a young age.

4. The Practice

An MoU was signed by the Heads of St. Mary's College, Thrissur and St. Mary's Convent U.P. School, Chiyyaram. According to the agreement, forty deserving students with strong desire for knowledge and education without discrimination of caste and creed were selected from V to VII classes and the College adopted them under the sponsorship project. Financial support is provided to these students at the beginning of every academic year. In addition to this a one day orientation programme is organized every month for the holistic development of these students. The Departments take turns in organizing these activities and faculty and students of the College are actively involved. The forty students are also taken for a one day outing every year and brought to the College when exhibitions and fairs are conducted. Workshops and seminars are also organised



to provide training to the teachers of the school so that they can support the students to achieve the holistic development envisaged by the College.

5. Evidence of Success

The enthusiastic response of the students to the activities and programmes organised is evidence of the success of the project. A record of the academic performance of these students is maintained by the College and the students are performing better with each passing year.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources required

The implementation of a project of this kind involves a large amount of finance as well as human resources. A lot of administrative work is also involved. It is not easy for the institution to organize and administer the project effectively. Financial constraint is also a major hurdle in realizing this Project. St. Mary's School Chiyyaram is approximately 10 kms away from the College and access to the School is difficult for the faculty and students. Thus there are a lot of problems in implementing the project. But the noble vision of providing holistic development to the young is enough of stimulus to overcome these hurdles.

7. Notes

It is mandatory to sign an MoU by the collaborating institutions and to specify the terms and conditions of agreement. It would be highly appreciable if parents and local community members are involved in the project.
